

Another Cuban Affair. It is said that the President has received information, that another Cuban expedition is being fitted out. A strict watch is now kept on the parties suspected.

A man named McCarty, residing at Kenosha, Wisconsin, murdered his wife a short time since, by forcing her into a hog-head of water, and keeping her under until she drowned. He should die the same death.

A Washington letter writer says this is a very temperate Congress. He has seen four Senators reeling along the avenue at one time.

A young lady drowned herself at Quincy Ill., on the 5th inst. She left letters stating that she intended to commit the act rather than be dependent upon her sisters.

The Kentucky papers are complaining of the scant tobacco crop this year. They state that not more than half an average crop will be saved.

The Mayor of St. Louis has issued a proclamation, in which he notifies masters and owners of steamers that they will be fined \$500 if they bring a case of cholera or other disease into that city.

Counterfeit two dollar notes on the State Bank of Indiana are circulating extensively in the interior counties of Kentucky.

There were several deaths from coup de soleil in St. Louis, on the 10th. The mercury stood at 93 deg.

Melancholy Accident. Boston, Aug. 16. An accident of a most melancholy and distressing character occurred yesterday afternoon, at Lincoln, involving the lives of fourteen persons, all women, and children, most of them connected with the First Christian Society of Lynn, who went to Lynnfield on a picnic. The party chose a delightful spot on the border of a beautiful pond. About 2 o'clock, a party of 29 went on a large flat-bottomed row boat for an excursion on the pond and when about one hundred yards out from shore, the boat capsized and fourteen were drowned. The accident has thrown the community of Lynn into the deepest distress.

From Yucatan. The latest news from Yucatan, received in this country, is only to 21st June, and comes by the way of the city of Mexico. Every thing was still continued. The negotiations with the Indians amounted to little or nothing. At last accounts from the seat of government, a pronunciamento was expected in favor of Santa Anna, and of the transformation of all Mexico into one centralized Republic. At the head of this movement is Gen. Michelorena and the Comissary Castellanos, the former of whom is to be Dictator when the present Government is deposed. Gov. Barbachano, on the other hand, wishes to separate the State from the Mexican Confederation, and declare its independence. The Indians are also not united among themselves; they have killed their leader Jacinto Pat; this however does not interrupt their warlike operations against the whites.

Review of the Portsmouth Market, for the week ending, Aug. 19, 1850. GENERAL REMARKS.—Business for the week now ending has been tolerably fair, and as the prevailing epidemic has subsided, the country wagons are coming in, loaded with grain or produce, and taking home their supplies. There have been handsome amounts of cash paid out for Wheat during the week, the quotations of which will be found under the appropriate head. River is receding slowly, and but few boats are running. It may have escaped the notice of our readers, that nearly all the travel to the east, now goes by the way of the Lakes, instead of by river, and over the mountains as heretofore, hence there is little necessity for passenger boats. Money is still easy at the Counters of our Exchange and Banking Houses.

The following review of our markets is respectfully submitted. FLOUR & GRAIN.—There have been heavy sales of flour during the week, at prices giving little remuneration to the manufacturers. The market opened on Monday at \$3.90, but declined next day. The average of sales has been \$3.75, during the week. A choice brand arrived from Union Mills. A choice brand arrived by canal, is offered this morning at \$3.65. At retail the customary advance over wholesale rates is obtained. Wheat still brings 70c for choice quality, we quote 65 to 70 as the average sales. Oats have declined—sales from wagon at 23, 23 & 25, the market closing with downward tendency, and at lowest quotation named. We hear of no transactions in Corn.

COFFEES.—A speculative demand has sprung up for coffee, and an advance is noted of fully half a cent over last week's current prices. Prime Coffee is held at 11 cents in lots.

SUGAR & MOLASSES.—As season advances these staples acquire increased firmness, although they have not advanced over last weeks prices. Sales of Sugar by hhd. at 62, by bl. lb. at 13 additional. In Loaf and Havana Sugars, there has not been a corresponding advance. Molasses is held at 33 and 24 by bl. Sugar-house 37 1/2 to 40c.

BACON.—The demand for Bacon as noted last week is still limited, and confined to the retail sales. We do not alter our figures from last week. Sales of Lard at 62c.

WHISKEY.—Sales of Whiskey at 21 and 22c, demand limited. A shipment to Mayville to-day, is understood at the latter figure.
