Requisition papers were out to procure his return from Indiana, but he escaped there, and seems to have been stealing back to the vicinity of the place where the deed was committed so to elude the search until the interest would subside, and was hiding in the woods about Cambridge in the day time, and coming to town at night. He was arrested here, in an ambush for the criminal, with the above result. It will be remembered that the quarrel resulting in the murder was about the removal of a chicken coop.

ROBT. HAPPER, one of the oldest citizens of the county, died at his home in Barnesville, on Saturday night. He was born in Fayette county, Pa., in September, 1797, and removed with his parents to Belmont county, two miles north of St. Clairsville, in the year 1800, where he lived until he was twenty years of age, when he removed to Barnesville, where he resided until his death. Deceased was widely known in the county, and was universally respected as a good citizen and upright man. He was a charter member of Friendship Lodge No. 82 F. and M. S. Barnesville. His funeral took place on Monday, and he was buried with the honors of the body of which he was an esteemed member. He was attended by numerous relatives and friends, who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to the remains of one whose long life had been honorable and well spent.
