The Vote in Pennsylvania. New York, Oct. 26.

A dispatch from the editor of the Philadelphia Bulletin states that the fall vote in Pennsylvania, for Congress, shows a majority for the Opposition over the Buchanan candidates of 1,246.

The following is the aggregate vote for Congressmen: Union, 211,134; Democrat, 209,948—Union majority, 1,246.

We invite the attention of the public, to section FOURTH, of article FOUR, of the Constitution of the State of Ohio.

"Section 14. The Judges of the Supreme Court and of the Court of Common Pleas, shall, at stated times, receive for their services such compensation as may be provided by law, but they shall receive no fees nor perquisites, nor hold any other office of profit or trust, under the authority of this State or the United States."

Judge Hall has not resigned his office as judge of the Court of Common Pleas. Every vote cast for him, for Congress, is therefore by the Constitution of Ohio void. Watson is therefore our next Congressman, and the Governor of Ohio will issue to him a certificate of election, which Hall can contest if he thinks the effort will pay expenses.

Hall, evidently acted on the maxim "A bird in the hand, is worth two in the bush," and regarding this election as exceedingly doubtful, concluded to hold on to his present emoluments. Hurrah for Watson!

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INDIAN ALL RIGHT!

We have spent a week in various portions of the Hoosier State, and learned from personal observations the condition of politics there.

The Republicans fell behind by a small minority, but not on the National issues before the people—State officers being locofoco, while the House of Representatives is Republican, and the Senate Locofoco.

The temperance question was made a portion of the State contest, and it is well known to every man acquainted with the position of parties on this question, that the Republicans would not gain a vote, while they must lose largely by placing it in their platform.

"A BLOODED POINT."—In reply to the attacks of Mr. HALEY, of the Cincinnati Commercial on L. J. CAMPBELL, the Hamilton Intelligencer gives a synopsis of his various races:

In 1840, Mr. Campbell was a candidate for the first time. In every canvass he has made, he has had a larger vote than any other candidate on his ticket in every county in his district.

In 1851, when the district formed for Valladolidham, Samuel Ninton was beaten in it for Governor by Reuben Wood, about 1100 votes. In 1852, Campbell beat Valladolidham 450 in the same territory.

In 1853, Medill beat Barrere 2000 votes. In '54 Campbell beat Valladolidham 2,665.

In '55, Chase was beaten in the district 1004 votes. And in '55 Campbell leads the highest vote on the ticket 569.

If Campbell had only run the strength of his ticket, he would have been beaten by 543 majority! as it is he has a majority of sixteen votes! and is elected.

The method of disposing of Fillmore in the House of Representatives, should the election be carried there, being known to the Fillmoreners, its entire practicality, and the certainty of its execution, will lose him almost all the votes of sensible men now left him.
