IMPROVEMENTS IN THE ART OF HOUSE KEEPING .- It is sometimes said that there keeping than any other. It is quite clear that there are are not enough of them, and those which are made are not generally adopted. Let us refer now to what we regard as an improvement in the little art of shelling beans. The old method was making use of the thumb and fingers; then the use of a needle to prepare the pod to open readily. Now the method is to pour upon the pods a quantity of scalding water and the beans slip very easily from the pod. By pouring scalding water on apples, the skin may be easily slipped off, and much labor saved.

Omelet is simply egg beaten and fried in butter. Break three fresh eggs in a bowl, and a little pinch of salt and a teaspoonful of water, and beat the eggs thoroughly. Then put a tablespoonful of good butter into a flat frying pan, and hold the pan over the fire with the handle a little elevated so as to incline the mass begins to cook run a case knife share—to mrke a respectable livelihood. under it to keep it from burning to the pan.
