## THE STATE SOCIETY.

Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Organization Which Holds the State Fairs.

From the Detroit Post and Tribune.

The executive board of the state agricultural society were called to order Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock at the Russell house. In addition to the members of the board there were present delegations from the Michigan bee keepers' association, the state horticultural society, the sheep breeders' and wool growers, and the shorthorn cattle association.

Further reports of executive superintendents were received and referred. The general tone of the reports indicated universal good feeling and acquiescence with the awards on the part of exhibitors at the last fair.

The superintendent of the horticultural department reported a successful exhibition.

Mr. Baxter of the committee on the president's address reported a division of subjects and reference to the appropriate committees.

The secretary read a communication from the American Berkshire swine association, urging a uniform list of the prizes for swine by the various fairs, and limiting the competition of animals eligible to registry in the "Berkshire record." This communication was referred to the committee on the revision of premium list.

The secretary read a communication from the secretary of the Illinois state board of agriculture, inviting co-operation in sustaining the fat stock show at Chicago, which is under the direction of the board.

Mr. Henry Fralick tendered his resignation as member of the executive committee, which was accepted and a committee of nine appointed to present names to the board from which to fill the vacancy.

The president appointed the following standing committees for the ensuing year.

Finance—Wm. Ball, E. W. Rising, M. P. Anderson.

Rules—C. A. Harrison, G. W. Phillips, J. Q. A. Buntington.

Transportation—J. M. Sterling, W. J. Baxter, W. L. Webber.

Programme—W. H. Cobb, A. O. Hyde, F. V. Smith.

Reception—Philo Parsons, H. G. Wells, M. Shoemaker.

Printing—A. J. Dean, J. C. Sterling, John Lessiter.

Philo Parsons, G. W. Phillips and A. F. Wood were appointed a committee to confer with the committee of the horticultural society in regard to the union exhibition of the two societies at the annual fair.

The committee of the keeper's association were invited to present their claims to the board. H. D. Cutting of that committee stated that Michigan was one of the leading states in honey production. He made no demands on the society, but asked proper facilities for exhibitions, promising with these facilities a larger exhibition of the kind than has ever been held. This presentation was referred to the committee on rules.

Some discussion was had in regard to the appointment of a viewing committee wherein the securing of committees from out of the state was both favored and condemned. The whole matter was finally referred to the committee on rules.

The subject of the sales at fairs was referred to a committee consisting of Philo Parsons, W. J. Baxter, J. M. Sterling, A. J. Dean, and W. G. Beckwith.

The president appointed as the business committees for the ensuing year, John Gilbert, W. H. Cobb, A. O. Hyde.

A recess was then taken to 2 o'clock.

The board was called to order again. The committees on recommending names from which select a member of the board to fill vacancy reported unanimously the names of Dr. Mitchell of Jackson, Jacob Walton of Cheboygan and H. H. Hinds of Stanton. Dr. Mitchell of Jackson, was elected.

The superintendent of forage made his report. The reduction of expense in this department in 1881 was over \$500, while the amount of stock to be provided for was equal to that at previous fairs.

A recess was taken till 5 o'clock when Mr. Parsons of the committee of conference with the committee of the horticultural society reported. They recommended that she present relations with that society to be sustained, that they are doing a good work for the horticultural interests of the state, and that the agricultural society appropriate \$1,000 for premiums and \$1,400 for expenses in consideration of the horticultural society holding a union exhibition in connection with the agricultural society. This report was accepted and adopted.

Mr. A. O. Hyde of the committee appointed to examine the claim of H. B. Chapman relating to a premium on horses of several years ago, reported against the allowance of the claim.

A communication from the commissioner of agricultural was read inviting the state agricultural society to send delegates to the agricultural convention called to meet in Washington January 10.

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## STATE NEWS.

Charlotte W. Conger, only daughter of Frank B. Conger, son of Senator Conger, died at Washington, Sunday.

George W. Knight, an Ann Arbor book-keeper, married Miss M. Barnes, daughter of O. M. Barnes, of Lansing, Thursday.

The Bay City Tribune says, a letter mailed at Victoria, Vancouver's island on January 1, reached Bay City Monday. Three years ago it took 21 days to bring a letter from the same place.

The Lansing Republican says Lansing people are a long way from navigation, but they take pride in the fact that Michigan owns 445 steamers, while Illinois has only 136, and Wisconsin but 132.

The report of the State Salt Inspector shows that during the month of December, 1881, 150,579 barrels of salt were manufactured in Michigan, as against 148,130 barrels for the same month of 1880.

Wesley W. Hyde, of Grand Rapids, has been appointed Assistant United States District Attorney for the western district of Michigan, succeeding R. M. Montgomery, who has become Circuit Judge.

The state band tournament to be held at Jackson this year will be under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias band of that city. The dates are June 7 and 8, and the \$1,000 for prizes, etc., has been guaranteed.

Dr. Adams, assistant superintendent of the asylum for the insane at Kalamazoo was stabbed Friday, of last week, fatally by a patient at the institution. The instrument used was a knife recently lost by an attendant. He died early Saturday morning.

John Marsh, an employe at Cobb & Mitchell's mill in Cadillac, had his clothes caught on a revolving shaft Monday and died soon after he was extricated and after both legs had been amputated above the knee. Marsh leaves a wife and two children.

The Capac Argus says, Lexington people pledge themselves to raise \$30,000; Almont, \$30,000; Brockway, \$10,000; and Elk Corners sent word that \$10,000 would be raised at that point to aid in the construction of a narrow gauge railroad from Detroit to Port Austin.

The Jackson county board of supervisors having taken the ground that justices of the peace are not entitled to fees in cases where the accused pleads guilty, the justices applied to the supreme court for an order requiring the supervisors to show cause for such action, thus raising the legal question before the highest court.

At Jackson on Thursday of last week Dr. North, assisted by Dr. Cook, vaccinated 310 railroad men in the employ of the Michigan Central in two and a half hours. Seven hundred more to be vaccinated there, the company meeting the expense, making a thousand in all. At Detroit and Chicago similar action has been taken by order of the company's managers.

The balance of cash in the state treasury, December 31, 1881, was \$1,354,667 42 cents; for the week ending January 7, 1882, were \$76,424. 05; payments for same time, \$42,457. 28; leaving a balance, January 7, 1882, of \$1,388,634 19; of which \$589,000 belong to the sinking fund, \$603,005 05 are held in the trust funds, and \$199,629 14 are available for general purposes.

Of the ten new engines ordered some months ago at the Jackson locomotive works six have been finished up and put in commission, and the balance will be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible. Ten first-class engines have also been ordered from the Sehenectady locomotive works by the Central, three of which have been built and delivered and set at work hauling trains.—Jackson Patriot.

The new insane asylum commission, consisting of Perry Hannah, of Grand Traverse, chairman, Dr. Van Duesen, of Kalamazoo, W. H. Riley, of Constantine, Milton Butler, of Mt. Clemens, and C. M. Wells, of Kalamazoo, secretary, arrived in Detroit Monday. Tuesday they began a conference with Alexander Chapoton, of Detroit, also a member of the commission, to decide upon plans for the new insane asylum at Grand Traverse. Architects from Detroit, Grand Rapids and other cities will compete.

Gaylord Herald: Mr. W. Chapman of Livingstone township brings us a sample of what seems to be a species of coal, or peat, but what it really is seems to baffle the knowledge of all those who have seen it. In appearance it resembles soft coal except that it is lighter and softer. It burns very nicely, producing a bright light. Mr. Chapman informs us that the deposit of this material is almost unlimited, being near the surface and several feet in depth. Mr. Chapman flatters himself with having a rich thing in this deposit, and thinks it can be utilized for fuel or for the manufacture of gas.
