So the Years Go.

One more day and the year 1882 will have gone with the great number which make up the centuries of the past. It has been a year whose history will not only be written upon pages of white paper but, with some, it is idelibly impressed upon their memories for all time. As it passes away, we see it laden with the joy and sorrow of human experience. For one, it bears the joy of new-found love, while for another its history is only that of the mourner's tears. Some have been wrecked upon the shoals of despair while others have been lifted to the mountain top of prosperity. How gladly would some of us check it in its swift flight, and call it back, and so change the facts that its history might be differently written. But no; the history of that lost fortune, that disgraced character, the departed friends or those blasted hopes, is written and no power can change it. The mantle of night will fold around the departing year and the book will be closed, but as the morning ushers in the new year can we not catch inspiration, form higher hopes and aspirations, and make it one that shall add a rich volume to the library of time.

Those Trespass Cases.

In September last, John H. Welch, special agent of the Interior department, entered complaints before Geo. E. Frost, United States commissioner, against Isaac J. Stewart, of Cheboygan, Stephen Kissenger, Harry T. Dagwell and Frank Russell, of Tuscarora township, for taking pine timber from homesteads before titles had passed from the government. Deputy Sheriff Nuite, armed with the proper warrants, arrested the parties and they at once appeared before the commissioner with their attorney, Geo. W. Bell. Cases not then being ready for trial, and the commissioner being obliged to be away for some time, by consent of parties the examination was postponed until last Wednesday, at which time all appeared. The interests of the government were cared for by Hon. S. M. Cutcheon, of Detroit, the U. S. District attorney. The charges against I. J. Stewart were admitted and he was held in his own recognizance, to appear at the March term of the U. S. court at Detroit. In the case of Harry T. Dagwell, the fact of his selling pine from his homestead was not denied, but he made such a good showing, as to the improvements he had made on his land, and the proceeds of the pine sold had all been used in said improvements, that the commissioner concluded that although there might have been a technical violation of law, yet the intentions of Dagwell were good, and the spirit of the law was complied with. He therefore was discharged.

The cases of Kissenger and Russell were gone into at great length, and it was after ten o'clock p. m. before evidence was all in. The commissioner held the matter for further consideration, and will render his decision January 3rd.
