CHEBOYGAN MATTERS.

Yesterday was hot enough for ice cream.

The brick walls of Joseph Spooner's building are growing rapidly.

A glorious shower last night and this morning the grass is springing up, as if by magic.

Cheboygan is going to have a new meat shop. It will be located on Black River avenue.

The leak in the water main, at the lower end of Main street, has been repaired. A defective joint was the cause.

A basket social will be held at the residence of Joseph Rife, Mullet Lake, Friday evening of next week, for the benefit of Rev. West, of Indian River.

Engineer Adams and his assistant, Mincer, have repainted the waterworks pumps, and shown their aesthetic taste, adorning the top of each with a vase containing a handsome bouquet.

The Michigan Central railroad has given notice to all its agents that cars will be transferred at the straits without delay, and will go through to upper peninsula points without breaking bulk.

Fred Lent has joined the band again, and a brand new tuba arrived Wednesday morning for him to manipulate. The band is making commendable progress in the excellence of their playing, and is a credit to Cheboygan.

W. & A. McArthur are inaugurating a measure that Cheboygan has long needed, the establishment of a regular retail lumber yard. They propose keeping a well assorted stock on hand at all times, so that they can fill any demand on short notice.

C. A. Gallagher intends having his new store, north of the Grand Central, lighted with gas, and has received a machine for its manufacture from the Combination Gas Machine company, of Detroit. He is having the room re-plastered, thoroughly repaired and repainted, and will have a neat place.

The fourth annual session of the inter-denominational ministerial association of Northern Michigan will meet at Cadillac on the 25th and continue the two following days. Dr. Hartley, pastor of the Congregational Church of this village, is on the programme for a prominent part.

Notice is given elsewhere of the dissolution of the merchant tailoring firm of H. J. Miner & Co., Mr. Miner having purchased the interest of George Fax. He has engaged the services of an experienced cutter from Detroit, and will continue the business in connection with that of general clothier.

There are a couple of boys around town trying to get themselves into trouble. Last week they were discovered endeavoring to set fire to a pile of hop poles near the water works house, and Sunday they set on fire a pile of bark and rubbish, at the lower end of Main street, endangering the dock property of W. & A. McArthur.

Work at the waterworks well has been progressing satisfactorily this week. They are down about seventy feet below the tubing, and the rock shows no signs of caving. A magnificent stream of water flows, coming up through the 4 1/2 inch tubing above the floor of the drill house, and is constantly increasing in volume as the hole deepens.

Egbert A. Smith, son of Thompson Smith, and family, are removing from Toronto to Duncan City. He is going to build an elegant residence during the summer, the plans of which are made, and the grounds laid out. Their household goods arrived on the propeller Canada yesterday, and Mr. Smith and family are expected sometime before the close of the month.

We are glad to state that there will be a line of boats on the inland route this season. The steamers Northern Belle and either the Mary or the new boat being built by Chas. R. Smith, will compose the line. The Belle making daily trips from the head of Crooked lake to the Mullet Lake House and return, and the other steamer making the trip on this end of the route. They will commence running about the middle of June.

All will be glad to learn that the fine summer resort hotel, the Mullet Lake House, will be opened again this season. C. D. Farmer, proprietor of the Farmer House, of this village, has made arrangements with the owners, Smith Bros., for the use of the house and furniture for the season, and will open it about the 20th of June. The hotel enjoys an enviable reputation as a pleasure resort, and Mr. Farmer intends that it shall not retrograde under his management. The steamers on the inland route will commence running about the time the hotel is opened.

James J. Brown has leased three rooms of C. A. Gallagher in his building north of the Grand Central hotel, and will fit them up in good style and occupy them for a law office.

S. LeGault, sr., is putting up quite an addition to the Benton House. The addition is in the rear, on Water street, two stories high, adding four rooms up stairs, and one large room the ground floor.

Dr. Lenderink, German Homoeopathic physician, late of Reed City, has secured rooms in the Paquette block, over A. W. Westgate & Son's shoe store, and located for the practice of his profession. See his card elsewhere.

A. P. Thompson, formerly of Sandusky, Ohio, has rented Paquette's room, in frame building opposite the postoffice, and will open a jewelry store next week if his stock, purchased in New York, arrives as he expects.

The new safe for the village arrived on the Atlantic Tuesday and was placed in the council room the same day. It is from the Detroit Safe Company, and has on it "City of Cheboygan." A little soon it is true, but then it is coming.

George E. Frost has purchased from James J. Brown the building now occupied by the latter as a law office and will take possession next week, where he will be glad to receive calls from his friends, and especially from those desiring to leave a retainer for legal services.

Mason & Morgan's Uncle Tom's Cabin Co. are announced for next Wednesday evening at the Town Hall. This company claim to present this great drama in a manner unsurpassed, and have received very flattering notices from the press of the state, where they have appeared.

Dr. Gerow is preparing to move the old Backus residence back on Huron street, in order to make room for his brick block. The Oddfellows, we understand, are figuring with the doctor to induce him to put on a third story for a lodge room. We hope they may come to terms.

The alarm of fire yesterday forenoon was caused by the cedar on the river bank opposite Nelson's store catching fire, it is supposed by the sparks from a passing tug. The fire was put out before it had done much damage. The Fire Department turned out promptly and were ready for business.

We have received notice from responsible parties, that there is a prophesied and promised birth of a semi-weekly newspaper to take place at St. Ignace, on or about the 5th of June, to be christened the St. Ignace News. It will be the first birth of the kind on record in this section. May it live long and be happy.

Undersheriff Lynn arrested Edward Wall yesterday and took him before Justice Fife, when he was arraigned for burglary, having stolen two silver watches at the Harbor House. Wall plead not guilty, was taken to jail, when he requested that his plea be changed to guilty. The county boards him till the next term of circuit court, when he will be tried and sentenced.

Superintendent Chase, of the state fisheries, spent Tuesday in the village. The 25,000 land-locked salmon, hatched at Wm. Elliott's hatching house, were packed and shipped to Teal lake, a half mile from Negaunee, Marquette county. Mr. Chase says this lake is a beautiful one, about 2 miles long and a half mile wide, with bold rocky shores, and thinks it particularly adapted to this species of fish. Monday they brought up 2,000,000 whitefish from the Detroit hatchery going to lake Michigan, in Marquette county, on the Marquette, Houghton and Ontonagon railroad. He informed us that if the legislature made a sufficient appropriation, there will be a state hatchery started at some place in Northern Michigan, and from his conversation we infer, that as far as he was concerned, he thought very favorably of Cheboygan as a good point for the hatchery to be located.

Frank Chevallier, employed at the big Duncan City mill, had three fingers sawed last Tuesday, and a man named Befoe had a hand badly mutilated at the watermill the first of the week. Drs. T. A. & C. A. Ferris rendered surgical aid.

A. P. McKinnon is getting out poles for the telephone exchange and the work of setting them will commence shortly. Those on Main street will be 40 feet high, peeled and painted. A room in the Kessler block has been secured for an office.

The grand millinery opening of Miss Emily Elliott, Wednesday and Thursday, proved the attraction of the week to the ladies. The beautiful goods were admired, praised and purchased. She has lots of them on hand yet, and is anxious to show them.

The semi-annual conference of the Bishops of the M. E. church, held at Pittsburg, Pa., last week, made the following appointments for Michigan conferences for this year: Detroit, at Flint Sept. 12th; Michigan, Albion, Sept. 5th; Bishop Harris to preside.

We noticed a large number of empty kerosene barrels on the dock this week for shipment, that had not the inspection brand cancelled. Those selling them should remember that the fine is \$1.00 per barrel, for disposing of them without cancelling or removing the brand.

The clam shell found the dredging too hard at the piers of the Southern Michigan Cedar and Lumber Company, for it to do any good, and it was towed back to the harbor. It completed all the work it could do in the harbor Tuesday of this week, and Thursday night left for Bay City.

At the spring meeting at Maysville, Ky., Watts S. Humphrey, of this place, had horses entered, Wm. T. in the 2:50 race Tuesday, and Mollie Harris in the 2:34 race Wednesday. A horse named Sotham won the 2:50 race in three straight heats, Wm. T. coming in third each heat. Time, 2:25; 2:32; 2:33 1/4. In the 2:34 race Alcey won; best time 2:34; Mollie Harris winning second money.

A Cheboygan Steambarge.

Mr. Cooper, of Buffalo, N. Y., a ship builder of large experience, and the man under whose supervision the fishing tug Messenger was rebuilt last summer, after she burned, is in the village, and has been engaged this week in drafting the plans for a large steam barge he is going to build for our enterprising townsman, W. S. Smith. Her capacity will be 300,000 feet of lumber. Her dimensions, 160 feet keel, 30 feet beam, and 12 feet depth of hold. We understand it is the design to build her here at Cheboygan, so that she will be in reality a Cheboygan boat in every respect. Mr. Smith has always shown a disposition to patronize and sustain home institutions, and in this respect is entitled to great credit. Engaged in manufacturing lumber extensively, he can always find employment for the craft in transporting the products of his mill. That the boat will be a credit to Cheboygan, all who know Mr. Smith need no assurance.
