NAVINE.

The City of Cleveland arrived on time Wednesday, and for once had a clear river.

The Flora arrived up on time yesterday morning and called in going down in the afternoon.

The schooner T. J. Avery arrived yesterday, and J. E. Nichols is loading her with lumber.

The Keweenaw arrived up on time last Sunday, and called in, bound down, during the afternoon.

The Atlantic arrived up Tuesday forenoon, and called in about nine o'clock that night, bound down.

The steam yacht Mary took a number of passengers over to Algoma Mills last Sunday, returning Monday.

The Van Raalte has no trouble in making her run on the Sault route, arriving at each destination in good season.

The Algoma will remain in dry dock at Detroit until the latter part of next week. She is receiving new and stronger steel plating.

The schooner Flying Cloud arrived yesterday morning and is loading lumber for Chicago from the Cheboygan Lumber Company's dock.

The schooner C. J. Magill arrived Monday evening and took on a cargo of lumber from W. & A. McArthur, for their Chicago yard, and sailed Thursday.

The Messenger continues to make about as regular times a railroad train, and is meeting with success, and she and officers proving popular with the public.

The propeller Lawrence arrived Tuesday evening and left the same night for Chicago. She was detained ten or twelve hours, after leaving the Beavers, by a dense fog.

The Canadian steambarge Clinton and consorts, Grimby and Clyde, called in Wednesday morning to report at the custom house, and remained in port until in the afternoon.

The schooner Barbarian arrived Monday and loaded lumber from the Cheboygan Lumber company, and cleared Wednesday for Chicago. The captain sailed in, beating the harbor tugs out of a tow.

The tug C. M. Gifford started Wednesday morning for St. Mary's river to tow dump scows for Carlin, Stickney & Cram, but found it rather breezy and returned and waited until evening, when she took a fresh start.

The tug Oswego, of Grummond's line, called in Thursday after coal. She was returning from having assisted the Winslow in getting the schooner A. G. Morey off. The latter was relieved and towed to Bailey's Harbor by the Winslow.

The barge Fame was left at Duncan City by the steambarge Weston Saturday afternoon, and the latter, with the rest of her tow, proceeded to Manistique. The Fame took on a cargo of lumber for Detroit and was taken in tow by the Weston, last evening, bound down.

Owing to C. R. Smith being disappointed in receiving a boiler for his new steam yacht, the Mary did not leave for the Traverse City and Northport route, but will remain and run from Mackinac to the Mullet Lake House, in connection with the Northern Belle, on the inland route.

Monday a sturgeon was caught at the mouth of the river that was six feet and one inch in length. Will VanValkenburg sold sturgeon steaks for several days.

Dr. Lenderink concluded that the health of the citizens of Cheboygan was too good to support so many doctors, and Tuesday left for Alpena, to hang out his shingle in that city.

The improvements and additions being made at the mill of the Southern Michigan Cedar and Lumber Company are nearing completion, and it is expected the mill will start up again next week.

Thursday they struck a magnificent flow of water in the artesian well at the water works. It flows up, filling the five-inch pipe, and rises above the floor of the drill house, and makes a very handsome fountain, as it flows over in a sheet around the iron pipe. It is estimated to flow 75 gallons of water per minute. The well yesterday noon was down to a depth of 305 feet.

The first of the week the contractors at the water works well drilled through about ten feet of sand rock, which was strongly impregnated with oil, so much so that water brought up with the drillings in the sand pump, when put in a vessel soon became covered with a greasy scum, that could be easily gathered with a spoon. Mr. Spiller, who is an experienced well borer from the Pennsylvania oil regions says that such a discovery there would suffice to cause a number of wells to be sunk.

Massachusetts medical society, by vote of 62 to 58, decline to admit women to membership.

North Vernon, Indiana, was struck by a tornado Sunday night, the town badly wrecked, and several persons badly injured.

United States Minister Benjamin, in presenting his credentials to the Shah of Persia at Teheran, received a cordial welcome.

Fearful Tornado swept over Clarendon, Pa., Tuesday night, demolishing 86 large oil rigs and five buildings and deluging the town.

The archbishop of Quebec has issued a mandate disapproving any connection by his flock with secret societies, including labor unions.

General Grant has agreed to loan to the Southern Exposition at Louisville several objects of art collected by him in many parts of the world.

Secretary Chandler, who is at the bedside of his sick mother at Concord, declines positively to be a candidate to the United States from New Hampshire.

Frank Rodgers, a brakeman, attempted to eject a negro tramp from a train Sunday near Stockwell, Ind., when the tramp shot him mortally and escaped.

Von Bennigsen, a leading member of the German National Liberty party, has resigned his seat in the Landtag and Reichstag, causing a sensation in Berlin.

The Prince of Montenegro has closed all the cafes and drink-shops in his realm, abolished all titles, and forbidden the wearing of any "luxurious apparel."

The steamer City of Rome, next to the Great Eastern in size, went aground Saturday, near Sandy Hook, N. Y. was floated off and proceeded on her voyage Sunday.

The seventeen-year locusts have made their appearance in the suburbs of Pittsburgh in great swarms. They seem to come out of the ground, and are breeding rapidly.
