

A Saw Mill Wanted.

James Myers of Munro township called at the TRIBUNE office Thursday. He reports that portion of our county rapidly improving, the settlers all actively and industriously engaged in clearing up their farms. He says they need a saw mill bad and that the citizens of that section are willing to contribute a good bonus to any party or parties who will put up a mill on Skunk lake, a lake one mile wide by about three miles long and situated five miles east of Levering station on the G. R. & I. railroad and in one of the best hardwood sections in northern Michigan. It is estimated that there is about 5,000,000 feet of pine that could be had and an immense quantity of hemlock. Thirty or forty of the settlers have expressed themselves willing to contribute \$25 each as a bonus. Mr. Myers says he will lease them a site at the foot of the lake, with all needed ground for operations, rent free, and in addition give about 125,000 feet of hemlock logs that he has already cut near the location. The settlers are greatly retarded making improvements, owing to the difficulty of procuring lumber. There are now between seventy and one hundred families in that part and prospects of more. He says the farming lands are equal to any in this part of the state and is satisfied a saw mill would prove a paying investment to the right parties.

A regular meeting of the Council of the village of Cheboygan was held at the Council Rooms on Tuesday evening, Oct. 2d, 1883.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.
