**MEMORIAL DAY.**

Cheboygan for the first time observes the occasion, and over five hundred people go to the cemetery to testify with appropriate services in honor of departed heroes.

Most generously has America remembered her soldiers, with bounty, wages, pensions, homes and watchful care. "The boys in blue" are treated and regarded as the guardians of the Nation's life and honor. Those who fell in the bloody struggles of the war for the Union are not and never will be forgotten. Their names, services and achievements, are cherished with that tender affection of a Nation's heart that cannot forget. Equal honor is given to every one whose life was a defence of the stars and stripes. In harmony with true patriotism Cheboygan did herself and country credit in giving on the 30th an expression of remembrance and appreciation of the brave defenders of all that is great and divine, in National government and Universal freedom. Without regard to political association or religious belief the people came together, and did well, that which made them better, and bore eloquent testimony to the priceless of our common inheritance made secure by the sacrifice, tolls, privations, suffering, and death of the courageous soldier.

**THE PROCESSION.**

At 1 p. m. the crowd gathered at the Town Hall and under skilled officers of the day were organized as follows: Cheboygan Band; Memorial monument; Soldiers; School Children; Firemen; City officials in carriages; Vehicles of different kind; Pelestrains. A great many walked outside the ranks, and the road along the line of march was well filled. The procession marched from Huron street to Main, thence to Court street and to the

were interesting, impressive, and instructive. The Chaplain offered prayer. "Rest, Rest, Brother Rest" was sung. The poem "Cover Them Over," by Will Carlton, was well read by Jas. J. Brown. The

**ADDRESS**

by Rev. Geo. Taylor, was written and delivered in a manner that plainly showed the speaker's heart, was in his subject, and that he fully appreciated the importance of the occasion. The speech was well received. "My Country 'Tis of Thee," was sung, then followed the solemn act of decorating the graves of the soldiers. Four graves were visited and received liberal offerings of bright flowers. The procession returned well satisfied with what had been done.

Everything was orderly done. The veterans 35 in number, and looked like they had seen service and could go again if necessary. The day was fine the flags were numerous, and flowers were plentiful and finely arranged. The music instrumental and vocal was good. H. A. Blake looks every whit a Colonel in his regimentals. J. P. 
