Mr. Fred Ming has charge of the school in district No. 1 Township of Duncan and is making a success of the school. The attendance is good and the scholars are interested in their studies and making commendable progress.

The boiler recovered from the wrecked propeller Canisteo, is to be taken out on the lower end of W. & A. McArthur's dock. It is quite a job and will take several days time.

Arrangements are being made to make a district library in accordance with the vote of the school board sometime since, the library to be kept in the school building.

Spencer Barclay, who for some time past has had charge of C. F. & W. A. Lyan's meat market, left yesterday for East Saginaw where he in company with Wm. B. Ellis who accompanied him will engage in the meat business. Mr. Barclay was formerly engaged in the packing business in the valley and we have no doubt but that the new firm will do a live business. They have our best wishes for their success.

Tuesday morning E. P. Vandewater, the telegraph operator at the station was bitten on the leg and wrist by a dog. The dog was chained to a seat in the passenger car and Mr. Vandewater was passing through when attacked. Not relishing such attention and to prevent a repetition of the same, he insisted on applying a remedy that should be applied to all canines of such vicious nature, and administered a dose of lead that put an end to the dogs carnivorous propensities.

The general opinion among the Republicans of Cheboygan county, so far as we have heard, and we have taken considerable pains to inquire of representatives of different sections, is that the county ticket nominated by the Republicans is the best and strongest ticket, as a whole, ever put in the field. It was put in nomination by delegates representing the people of the different portions of the county, and when the people nominate the candidates the result is that the candidates are usually elected.

Last Saturday upon complaint of the wife of a Polander, residing to the south of the road running from Cheboygan to Duncan City, Sheriff Harrington arrested the man upon the charge of abusing his wife. While making the arrest the Polander struck the sheriff with an ax making a slight gash in the breast of his coat, but the sheriff as is his custom secured the man. When the case came up for trial the wife who had entered the complaint failed to appear against her husband and he was let off. Had she appeared and testified to the facts as stated when she made the complaint, it is thought the man would have been given a term in the State House of Correction.

The tug Pendell towed in the harbor Tuesday noon the boiler from the wrecked propeller Canisteo. Messrs Kitchen, Snow and Dodd have had a difficult job of it, but persevered and conquered at last. The boiler is an immense one, being a ten feet shell and twenty-two feet in length, and weighing from thirty to forty tons. It was raised by means of two lighters with timbers placed across them. Upon these were placed large screws, and these attached to chains fastened to the boiler. When towed into port the boiler was drawing fourteen and a half feet of water. The boiler seems to be in good condition, and good for many years' service. The weather recently has been so stormy that it made the work very difficult.
