

The death of the King of Hanover is not an event of very great importance. For several years he has not been heard from as taking a prominent part in political movements. He was something of a tyrant and a good deal of a Tory, but old age—(we believe he was upwards of eighty years old when he died)—had withdrawn him from the active affairs of government during the later years of his life. He became King of Hanover on the accession of Queen Victoria, as the Kingdom could not be held by a woman. In 1837, when he entered upon his government, he secured the hatred of his subjects, by withdrawing the constitutional rights which William IV. had granted to the people of Hanover; but in 1840 he had to give them back, and in 1848, was driven to make still further concessions. His oldest son, 32 years of age, and for several years blind, succeeds him on the throne. [Providence Post.]
