Howard & Co., have already a large force in the field, which will be greatly augmented in the spring, and every exertion used to finish the road to Iowa within the current year. At Pontiac, the spacious grounds of ex-Gov. Richardson have been purchased, and will soon be covered with depot buildings, &c., and at other proper points further west, the requisite arrangements are on foot for similar purposes, evincing the enterprise and energy with which the work will be prosecuted to completion. From all these indications our citizens may well be congratulated that the Oakland and Ottawa Railroad, from being considered an affair somewhat problematical, has now become a regular "fixed fact."
