**CONSECRATION OF EMANUEL PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH, WOODSTOCK, VA.**—An eventful day in the history of Beckford parish, Shen. Co., Va., has come and gone, and all those interested in the occasion feel they have cause for thanksgiving to God. For several days previous to the consecration there had been a session of the Valley Convention, of which an account has appeared in this paper. On the morning of the 30th ult. the weather was threatening, but the clouds soon vanished, and the day was all that could be desired.  
Many persons came from Winchester and other places to attend the services, and, besides these, not a few of the citizens of Woodstock repaired to the church, so there was a large congregation, which encouraged the promoters of the undertaking.  
Besides the rector, Rev. W. W. Walker (who has since gone to his new parish, Belleair, O.) the clergy present were as follows: The Rt. Rev. G. W. Peterkin, D. D., Bishop of West Va., acting for the Bishop of Va.; the Rev. Dr. Hubbard, of Winchester, Va.; the Rev. T. Levee, of Hedgesville, W. Va.; the Rev. R. E. Mason, of Shepherdstown, W. Va.; the Rev. R. E. Roller, of Martinsburg, W. Va.; and the Rev. J. Owen Dorsey, of Washington, D. C.  
The instrument of donation was read by Gen. John G. Meem. The sentence of consecration was read by the Rev. Mr. Walker. Morning prayer was said by the Rev. Messrs. Roller and Levee. The sermon was preached by Dr. Hubbard, and was full of instruction. At evening prayer, Bishop Peterkin preached a large and able very practical sermon on the text, "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ."  
All present must have felt that it was good to be there, and the day can never be forgotten.  
The first meeting held by the Episcopals of this town for the erection of a church was held in the parlors of the old Moreland house, March 30th, 1878. At that time the membership consisted of 10 members.  
Church completed and consecrated August 30th, 1883.

**RESOLUTIONS OF THE FIRST CONVENTION OF THE SHENANDOAH COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION OF VA.**  
WOODSTOCK, VA., AUG. 29, 1883.  
The Shenandoah County Sunday School Union convened, pursuant to published call, in the Christian Church, Woodstock, Va., Wednesday, August 29th, 1883, 10 o'clock, A. M.  
The meeting was opened with singing a voluntary by the choir—followed, Work for the night is coming, by the Hymn, "Now be the Gospel Banner, &c." by the convention, after which an appropriate prayer was offered by Rev. W. W. Walker, of Mt. Jackson, Va.; and the meeting again uniting in singing, the Hymn, Stand up, Stand up for Jesus, &c.  
Mr. Geo. W. Miley was called to the chair, and M. Coffman appointed as secretary, pro tem; the chairman introduced to the convention Mr. M. L. Walton who delivered an address of welcome.  
On motion of M. L. Walton the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That all officers, teachers, and Sunday School scholars, and all Sunday School workers present be invited to seats in the convention and to participate in its work.  
On motion of C. E. E. Slickley, Rev. Wm. A. Crawford, County Supr. of Sunday Schools of Frederick Co. was invited to a seat in this body.  
On motion the chair appointed the following named gentlemen a committee to nominate permanent officers of this Convention, E. E. Slickley, T. L. Williamson, Monroe Funkhouser, Rev. W. W. Walker, W. H. Barzell, W. T. Williams, W. H. Hopewell, and Saml. Pence.  
The constitution suggested by the State Executive Committee, as the Constitution of the Sunday School Union of Shenandoah County was adopted.  
Whilst the convention was waiting for report from committee on permanent organization, Rev. L. A. Cutler of Louisa, Co. Va., addressed the convention, subject, What are the legitimate results of S. School teaching, the address was most excellent, and deserves more than a passing notice.  
At the conclusion of this address the committee on nomination for permanent officers presented the following— for President, Geo. W. Miley; Vice-President, Rev. A. A. J. Bushong; Rev. S. Henkel, D. D., Rev. J. R. Vanhook, Rev. I. N. Campbell, Rev. J. W. Hicks, Rev. C. W. Harvey, Rev. Geo. Whitmore and Elder E. B. Shaver, Secretary, M. Coffman, Ass't. Secty., A. G. Wynkoop, Treasurer, John W. Martin. Executive Committee, M. L. Walton, E. O. Henkel, R. E. Stoneburner, Monroe Funkhouser and N. B. Schmitt, report received, and adopted.  
In order to afford the convention an opportunity to attend Consecration Services at the Episcopal Church at 11 o'clock the meeting adjourned to meet at 11 o'clock, P. M.  
The morning session was then closed by singing the Doxology, and the benediction pronounced by Rev. Bushong.  
**AFTERNOON SESSION.**  
At 1:30 o'clock, P. M. Introductory exercises consisted in singing a Voluntary—Bringing in the Sheaves, Hymn, Hail sweetest, dearest thy, prayer by Rev. I. N. Campbell.  
Hymn, What hast thou done for me? was heartily sung, and prayer offered by Rev. D. H. Rhodes.  
Rev. W. A. Crawford Supt. of Frederick county S. S. addressed the Convention in a short speech. Rev. L. L. Smith, whose name appeared on the programme for the regular afternoon address, was introduced, and delivered a stirring speech, subject, The power and influence of the Sunday School.  
Various matters of business pertaining to the future work of the Union were fully discussed, and on motion by E. E. Slickley, all speeches limited to five minutes.  
On motion of Rev. L. A. Cutler the question—What are the greatest needs of Sunday Schools, was presented for discussion in five minute speeches.
