Who Executed Charles I?

In the burial register of Whitechapel under the year 1649 is the following entry:

Washington's Birthday.

Washington's birthday was made a legal holiday by vote of the Massachusetts legislature April 15, 1879. Thereafter, Feb. 22, 1875, was first a legal holiday. The many great projects of Mrs. Harrison may be held a receipt at her home on Feb. 22, to which all the people of the city of Boston were invited. Her house was open to the public on that day, and before and after the day became a legal holiday all the military companies of Boston would parade past her house on the 22d. Probably the first session of Washington's birthday being, among the first of the 12th. That was by the French troops at Newport, R. I., as the 11th fell on Sunday, the celebration was held on the 12th. This was according to the old style of reckoning.

Checking a Hemorrhage.
