MASSANUTTEN ACADEMY 10
HARRISONBURG H. S. O.
Massanutten Academy defeated the Harrisonburg High School eleven in football last Saturday on the academy grounds 10 to 0. The teams were evenly matched in weight and practice but the good material M. A. has this year was too strong for the visitors, and at no time was M. A.'s goal in danger.

The game was called at 3 p. m. by Referee Stieckley. While the halves did not lack for interest from beginning to end, at times the crowd went wild with excitement as some of the plays were made. Koozts and Hollingsworth tried with each other in taking the ball with the advantage in favor of Koozts. M. A. made gains repeatedly by end rushes—line bucking and punts. Another touchdown should have been credited to M. A. as Shutters fell on the ball back of the opponents goal on a punt in which the ball had been touched by the opponents—but the referee called it a touchback. Rather than dispute the point was yielded.

McCorkle, former coacher for U. of W. Va. team played quarterback for H. H. S. but with little evidence of strength in that position. He fumbled frequently at great cost to his team. One of Koozts' punts he missed the ball and Shutters nimbly picked it up and made 45 yards for a touchdown. Thus ended the first half. In the second half M. A. was on the offensive five yard line—certain for another touchdown by line plunges with Rudy—Keller—and E. Lewis—when the ball was fumbled and H. H. S. kicked it away from danger. Soon after in a forward pass by H. H. S. the ball was fumbled and again Shutters got hold of it for a 49 yard run which added five points to the score. Both goal failed.

M. A.'s team shows up very strong this year at the present time and good ball may be expected. The line is heavier than usual. Capt. Harrison plays tackle, H. Miller guard, E. Irwin tackle and Ben Rush guard—Shutters and Sutherland on the ends. Keller and Rudy make strong backs—Koozts fits at quarter, and Clarence Irwin plays full. The next game will be played on Saturday, October 12th at Woodstock, with the team from Bethel Military Academy. This will be the first time these teams will have had the chance to measure strengths and the outcome of this game will be watched with interest. Col. Kemper, a frequent visitor to Woodstock—is head-master of Bethel, and Mr. Charles Skyles is teaching there this year. M. A. expects a harder fight than she had last Saturday, but is practicing hard and regular for winning this game. The game will be called at 2.30 p. m. inasmuch as the Bethel boys will arrive at 1.05 p. m. and will want to leave on the 4.42 train.

VIRGINIA'S NATIONAL BANKS.
According to a statement issued by the Secretary of the Treasury, there are 100 national banks in Virginia with a total capital of \$12,175,800. Texas has 520 national banks, with a total capitalization of \$39,679,900. Kentucky has 141 national banks, with a capitalization aggregating \$1,098,400. Virginia, comes next, thus standing third among the States of the South.

North Carolina has sixty national banks, with a total capital of \$5,620,000. Tennessee has seventy-eight national banks, with a total capital of \$9,260,000. On the 14th of March, 1900, there were only sixty-nine national banks in Virginia, with a total of \$3,896,000, as against the 100 banks today, with a capital of over \$12,000,000. Only one other Southern State shows such a great percentage of gain in number of banks and in amount of capital invested in bank stock. In 1900 North Carolina had thirty-five banks, with a capital of \$1,886,000. Tennessee forty-two national banks, with a capitalization of \$2,245,000. Tennessee leads in the matter of rapidity in the seven years.

The total capital for the entire country is now \$606,704,775. In 6,620 banks. The total banking capital of the Southern States is now \$130,921,520, invested in 1,311 banks. Of course, none of the foregoing figures refer to private banks.
State Still After McCue Trial Costs
The state of Virginia is to make a final effort to collect the costs which it expended in the famous McCue murder trial. This was evidenced on the 21 when an appeal was allowed the state in the case of the commonwealth against the executors of the dead man. The state expended \$2,870 in the prosecution, trial, conviction and execution. The laws provide that in cases of felony the person convicted shall reimburse the state for the costs of the case. McCue killed his wife the first part of September, 1905. He was tried in the corporation court of Charlottesville.

The state undertook to collect the costs in the court which tried the criminal case and when a commissioner reported that the claim was not valid Judge Morris affirmed the finding of that official and a decree was entered accordingly. It is from that decree that the state is appealing.
