DR. CASPER C. HENKEL DEAD AT NEW MARKET.

Dr. Casper C. Henkel, a lifelong resident of New Market and for many years one of Virginia's most eminent physicians, died at 12:30 Monday afternoon after an illness of several months. His health had failed a year or more ago and his death was caused by diabetes. Dr. Henkel was 76 years of age. He was the eldest son of Dr. Samuel Godfrey Henkel, himself a physician of prominence. His mother was Miss Susan Colner, a member of the well known Augusta county family of that name. His academic training was in the old New Market Academy, famous in its day for the learning of its principal, the late Prof. Joseph Saljaria. He studied medicine under his father and completed his course in University of Pennsylvania. He served throughout the Civil War as surgeon in Jackson's Brigade, making a record of usefulness that had few equals in the army. At the close of the war he returned to New Market and resumed the practice of his profession, being associated with his uncle, the late Dr. Solon P. C. Henkel. His service in the Confederate army and his widely recognized professional skill at once made him one of the leading practitioners in the Valley. He devoted himself largely to surgery, but in every branch of his profession he bore an enviable reputation for skill and learning. His practice was a very extensive one locally, and patients frequently sought his services from distant points. Soon after the Civil War Dr. Henkel married Miss Margaret Miller, of Winchester, who survives him. He also leaves an only daughter, Mrs. Frank H. Rupert, of Wilmington, Delaware. Of his father's family there are surviving one brother and six sisters—Dr. Haller H. Henkel, of Staunton; Mrs. A. S. Miller, Mrs. Rebecca Koener, Mrs. W. P. Crickenberger, and Miss Ida M. Henkel, all of New Market; Mrs. Susan Moyers, of Florida; and Mrs. C. W. Heater, of Middletown, Va. Mr. Haller P. Moyers, agent at Harrisonburg for the Southern Express Company is a nephew. Dr. Henkel was for many years an influential member of the Lutheran church in New Market. His funeral was held at New Market, Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

SHOT BY BROTHER.

A shooting episode is reported from the Stony Man neighborhood of Page county, in which the victim, a woman clad in man's clothing. It is alleged, was shot by her brother, the woman at the time, it is said, having been found taking corn from her brother's field. A Luray physician was called and extracted about 40 shot from the woman's body. The facts became known Saturday in Luray, and efforts to obtain the particulars from persons living in the neighborhood were futile. From what can be learned it appears that a well-known and prosperous farmer has been recently bothered by thieves raiding his cornfields. He accordingly concealed himself in the field, and had waited only a short time when several figures emerged from the shadow of a clump of trees. Contenting himself with awaiting further developments, the owner kept quiet until the vessels carried by the marauders were filed. He then called for a surrender. In the stampede the woman was shot. The result was not known until the next morning, when a physician was summoned to dress the wounds of the man's sister, the wife of a well-known farmer.
