True Lovers. A few days since a loving couple from Pulaski county, Va., arrived at the Thomas House in this place, where the well-known marriage license messenger was dispatched to Mountville for the necessary papers. The time he returned, and the ceremony was performed. The woman was fifty-five years old, and has two children; the boy fifteen. It was then discovered to the sorrow that all their money had been spent, and that they were without funds to take them home. The woman is still here, and her husband has sought work on the railroad.

An Old Woman Frightened to Death. During the recent heavy rains our creek was swollen beyond its banks, and did much damage to the lands and gardens; the lower parts of the town, and terrifying the inmates. Murder. On Monday the 3d of August a shocking murder was committed near the residence of David Stephens, three miles north of Christiansburg. The parties to this bloody transaction were Wm. Clements, a Loyal Leagueer, who stabbed and killed Robert Stuart, an Irishman. Stuart being employed on the farm of Maj. Kent, started for home late in the evening, very drunk, in company with Mr. Cobridge, who held Stuart on his horse. When near Alhambra Church, Mr. Cobridge turned back to get some water which he had lost, leaving Stuart on the ground, as he had fallen from his horse. After going a short distance he met Clements, and requested him to take care of Stuart. Cobridge soon returned, and with Clements, assisted Stuart on his horse. He then went back to bring up his horse, which was tied to the fence. They had gone but a short distance when Cobridge, on coming up, heard Clements say, "No God!—I rebel shall run over me," at the same time striking backward, drove a knife into Stuart's breast, causing him to reel in the saddle. Stuart dismounted amid drunken mutterings, approached Clements and put his hand upon his leg, when Clements cut him twice in the arm. Cobridge then removed Stuart, asking him if he was hurt; to which he replied, "Yes, bodily," and died before he could be taken to the house. Clements has since been lodged in jail.

Failure at Mossy Creek, Tenn.
