To Make Vinegar.

Editors Southern Cultivator:—I enclose in a recent number of your paper, a call for a reliable mode of making good vinegar. I have, many times, made an excellent article of apple vinegar, which I regard as the best vinegar used, and if it will be of any service to you and your readers, you are very welcome to my method, as this is one of the very few returns I can make for the many valuable things I get from the Cultivator.

Procure a common cask, holding about forty gallons, and fill it with cider. Let the cider pass through the various fermentations and become hard cider, and when it becomes clear, some bright day in October, November, or December, draw it into pails and tubs, and when all the clear, hard cider is drawn off, then empty the cask and mother, if any; wash out the barrel clean, and then pour the contents of the pails and tubs back into the barrel; and, at once the acetous fermentation begins, and goes on till good vinegar is formed, which will be the next spring.

CHINA SOAP.—A correspondent of the Southern Banner gives the following recipe for soap making, and adds that it would be worth one thousand dollars in the hands of a selfish person and the world would have to untie the purse string to get it, but here it is free gratis.

Take six pounds of Potash, 75 cts. Four pounds of Lard, 50 cts. Four pounds of Rosin, 25 cts.

All amounting to \$1.50. Beat up the rosin; mix all together well and set aside for five days, then put the whole into a ten gallon cask of warm water and stir twice a day for ten days; at the expiration of which time, or sooner, you will have one hundred pounds of excellent soap for only \$1.50.

Sorrel.

There are few weeds more troublesome than sorrel, or more difficult to eradicate. Experience, however, seems to show that weeding or liming, in a proper way and in sufficient quantity, will destroy the pest, and prevent its future development. The growth of sorrel is the result of acidity in the soil, and lime, by its alkaline and sweetening action, tends to neutralize and correct. The growth of sorrel is far more common on light, sandy soils, of anti-calcareous character, than on lime formation where, indeed, it rarely appears. The quantity of lime that may be economically used, is a question to be decided by trial. It is rarely the case that argillaceous soils or those containing a large per centage of clay, produce this plant, although such is sometimes the case. Whenever it appears, the immediate application of lime and tillage is the only remedy. Too much cannot be said in favor of lime as a manurial agent. In all composts of whatever us designed, it should enter as an ingredient—the quantity being, of course, graduated by the character and vegetative capacity of the soil to which it is to be applied—the nature of the crop, being in a large majority of cases, merely a collateral consideration. In the reduction of green vegetable matter the use of quick lime is, indeed, indispensable. The heat produced by its slacking, and breaking up of the vegetable structure more effectually than can be effected by any other process.—Cur. Germantown Telegraph.

Road Making.

The following hints on this subject are excellent, and we print them readily, in addition to what we have already said in the same connection, in the hope that they will attract the attention of supervisors:

In road making one great requisite is the ready and total removal of all water. There cannot be a good road where water stands by the side of or on it. If the ditches have no ready outlet, the road bed will soak up the moisture, and thus remain rutted and muddy. It is vain to think of having a good road on a subsoil filled with stagnant water. Even on side hills, if water remains on the surface, it will injure the road by passing under. Provide then, if possible, for the thorough drainage of your roads either by surface or covered ditches.

See, then, that the road bed is evenly and slightly rounded, so that the water can readily find its way to the drains. If the soil is clayey or loamy, give it a few inches of gravel, or even coarse sand, and you will have a fine and pleasant passage way. If the soil is sandy, it needs an addition of clay to correct it, so that good roads may be had over the lightest sandy soils.—Maryland Farmer.

OIL FOR PRESERVING OIL.—When a barrel of cider is tapper it grows hard; that is, more and more acid, until it gets too hard to drink, if it is kept long on tap. This is occasioned by the air, which fills the cask above the cider as soon as it is drawn out. The air cannot be excluded, because the cider will not run from the tap if there is no air to press it out. If the cider is exposed long to the air, it will become vinegar. In fact, the way to make vinegar of cider is to expose it to the air as much as possible. To prevent the cider on tap from becoming acid, it is recommended, as soon as one or two gallons are drawn out, to pour into the bung-hole about a half a pint of clear sperm oil, or sweet oil, if it is preferred. It should be warm when poured in, and it will spread in a thin coat over the surface, and keep spreading as the cider is drawn out, and thus exclude the air, without giving any taste of oil to the cider.—This plan of preserving cider is worthy of farther attention. We have faith in it from knowing that all casks are the best we know of for storing cider, in-

parting no flavor. Sperm oil casks are more valuable for cider casks than for any other purpose.—Maryland Farmer.


