Booster Trip Successful

According to schedule, the much talked of booster trip took place Tuesday. A light drizzle of rain fell all night Monday night, and it seemed like the trip would have to be postponed, but E. J. Thayer got busy early Tuesday morning with the telephone, rounded the boys up, and the procession started at 8:30. The cars drove through the rain until Hooker was reached, but the roads were in fair shape and no delay was experienced on that account. Only small crowds greeted the boys at Tyrone and Hooker, but considerable advertising for the chautauqua and fair were distributed at both places, besides personal advertising matter of the different business houses. O. M. Woods in a Ford took the lead at Hooker and continued as pilot from there to Ochiltree. Only one stop was made between Hooker and Gray. Mr. Woods stopped at a farmhouse to inquire the best road to Gray, and when he got back to the main road the other cars had all arrived, the band was tuning up, and a short concert was given out there on the wide prairie for the two families that were present. This short entertainment made a good impression on those folks, and they ordered several pictures of the crowd, from Photographer Steele.
