LITTLE OPPOSITION TO LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Senator Capper Does a Little Investigating of His Own—More than Five to One for the League in Kansas.

While opposition to the league of nations may be increasing in the country, as the opponents of the league claim, it is not noticeably so, judging from the letters being received by Senator Capper. It is true that the number of letters opposing the league have increased but such letters are still vastly outnumbered by those favoring the league. As for organizations that have reported formal action in regard to the league, those opposing it are almost negligible as to numbers, while those favoring the league are numerous.

Altogether Senator Capper has heard from ninety-one organizations in Kansas. Of these nine oppose the league, six are non-committal, and seventy-six favor the league. These organizations embrace granges and labor organizations. Only four of the unions are opposed to the league. The six that are non-committal are labor organizations and in every case they thank the senator for having consulted them and defer to his judgement in the matter.

In a half dozen instances the indorsement of the league contains the proviso that American sovereignty must not be surrendered and in num-

erous other instances the organizations state their confidence in the senator's ability to handle the matter for his constituents. One man writes that the union of which he is a member is for the league but that there is no enthusiasm for it.

In addition to these letters giving the result of formal action by organizations, Mr. Capper is in receipt of literally thousands of letters urging him to support the league of nations.

NOTICE TO CUT WEEDS

To the owners and agents of owners of all property in the City of Liberal:

You are hereby notified that by virtue of the statutes of the State of Kansas and an ordinance of the City of Liberal you are required to cut or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds on all lots and pieces of land and in the streets or alleys in front of or abutting upon any lot or piece of land within the city. You are further notified that the statutes and ordinance provide that if the same is not done by the owners or agents then the same shall be done by the Street Commissioner and the costs and expense thereof assessed as taxes against property.

This ordinance will be strictly enforced and all owners and agents of lots or pieces of land within the city are hereby notified to immediately cut or otherwise destroy all weeds on all lots or pieces of ground and in the street or alley adjacent thereto, otherwise this will be done by the Street Commissioner and charged as taxes against such property.

Take notice, that a legal petition signed by A. G. Nutt and other householders of Fargo township, in said county, has been presented to the Board of County Commissioners, praying for the relocation of a county road, as follows, viz.: Beginning at the southeast corner of section 28-32-31, thence north to the southeast corner of section 16-32-31, thence east to the southeast corner of section 14-32-31, and ending at the county road heretofore laid out.

And that said Board, acting as viewers, will meet at the point of beginning of said road, as petitioned for, on the 25th day of June, 1919, and proceed to view said road, as the law directs, at which time and place all persons interested may attend and have a hearing. In case said viewers fail to meet on the day designated, they may meet on the following day, as provided by law, without further notice.
