LATE FLASHES ON PANHANDLE OIL DEVELOPMENT

From the Panhandle, Texas, Herald: McGee & Co., Smith No. 1, Hutchinson county, has drilled twelve feet since cleaning out the hole Monday. Parties who have returned from the well today report that the formations encountered are solid, indicating a very favorable condition.

Gulf, Wynn No. 1, has extended the 20-inch casing to the lime formation at 540 feet, at which point the drill was lost about ten days ago. The casing has been cut off, and it is expected that the drill will be recovered within a short time.

Casing is being moved to Coble-Haywood, Coble No. 1, in Hutchinson county. This is the well which encountered oil and salt water at about 3600 feet several days ago. The six inch pipe is to be run in the hole to cut off the water and permit further drilling.

Dial Well to be Tested

Tubing has been placed in the Gulf Production Co. Dial No. 1 well in Hutchinson county and as soon as storage and pump equipment is completed, a test will be made of the production of the 3000 foot well.

Conservative estimates place production at 500 barrels pipeline oil

per day, being free from water and other damaging contents.

Tipton, McConnell No. 1, is carrying 10-inch pipe at 1000 feet, after passing through a strata of salt water.

Humble Burnett No. 2, a short distance north of Panhandle, is delayed due to the failure of arrival of proper fishing tools.

An effort will be made to pull the 10-inch pipe which has been damaged by a crooked hole, as soon as the proper tools arrive.

This hole is over 2900 feet deep and the delay is a great disappointment to oil fans.

Silk, Bullington & Clark, Burnett No. 1, is fitting a braidenhead to the top of the casing. This fitting will conserve the flow of gas and will permit further drilling without the annoyance of the large gas flow to the drillers. The shutting off of the 25 million feet of gas with which the well is credited, will insure the early completion of the well, which is nearing 3,000 feet.

Texas, Burnett No. 1, is preparing to resume drilling after fishing for tools lost in the hole during the fatal fire of last month.


The new house just completed in town helps the looks of our little burg.
