Hon. Lot Ravenscraft was elected State Senator from the 37th Senatorial district. We have not learned his majority, but he is elected just the same and we congratulate him. Lot is another man that the people of this county need not be ashamed of in the Legislature.

We heard a Republican remark the night after the election that "the Republicans of Meade county were the biggest set of fools on earth." Now we disagree with the good brother, as we think they are not fools, but have more common sense than to be led about by one certain "ring." It shows their good judgment.

At the late election in this township not one Prohibition ticket was voted, yet we have a Temperance society, whose object is to put down the traffic. We are of the opinion that a large number of these people voted for Mr. McKinley, who flatly refused to abolish the army saloons at the posts where the American soldiers are stationed.

A Murder in Gray County.

From the Cimarron Jacksonian, Nov. 9.

The home of S. L. Kelley, ten miles south of Cimarron, was the scene of a terrible tragedy yesterday hear the noon hour, in which Mrs. Reba Burgess shot and instantly killed her husband, Burke Burgess.

The trouble is said to have grown out of the jealousy of the wife of another woman, Miss Maud Kelly, who resides about a quarter of a mile from the Burgess home.

The news of the tragedy reached this city about 3 o'clock yesterday evening. Coroner George Hiatt summoned a jury and repaired to the scene of the murder. Reaching the Kelly place late in the evening only a part of the testimony was taken when the further hearing was postponed until 10 o'clock this morning.

The testimony shows that the deceased was working in his field and about 11 o'clock he rode over to the Kelly home. His wife saw him going there and at once followed him, and arriving there soon after he did, she entered the house and claims she found her husband in a compromising position with the Kelley girl, who was at home alone, the other members of the family being absent.

Mr. Lear says the woman began to tell him her story and he tried to pacify her, but she declared that if she had a gun she would kill her husband. She finally said that Kelly had a gun and she would go in and get it and fix them, evidently intending to shoot the girl, too.

The pistol used was a 38 calibre, the ball entering the face just below and near the left corner of the mouth and lodging in the head.
