JOHN LAWRENCE DEAD

Jonathan B. Lawrence was born August 11, 1853 in New Castle, Ohio. He came to Kansas in 1880 in the vigor of his young manhood and at once entered into the life and spirit and push of this young state. He engaged in the cattle business for several years but abandoned that and embarked in the grocery business in Chanute which he followed till he was stricken with that relentless disease, Locomotor Ataxia.

In 1884 he married Miss Maggie Venters, one of earth's sweetest and best young ladies. To them have been born three children, but one is now living, Miss Sadie who is budding into womanhood.

John was an active bright young man, full of energy and ambition and a successful business career was predicted for him, but in the prime of his manhood, some 16 years ago, he was attacked by this fatal disease and his active life cut short. For all these years he has been an invalid and for several years almost entirely helpless, depending upon the loving care of his noble wife, his sisters and his devoted brother, George. For years he stood up bravely and made a heroic fight against the encroachment of this relentless disease, suffering untold agonies of mind and body, but at length he gave up the hopeless contest and only prayed that the end might speedily come when he could find relief in death. He died at the home of his sister Mrs. Tillie Keys, Friday, April 24.

The remains were brought to Chanute to the home of his old friend and former partner, D. E. Morey, where the funeral services were held, Sunday afternoon. Elder Kitchener led in prayer and made a short talk of consolation to the friends and Mrs. Penny sang as she alone can sing on such occasions and all that was wont of our long time friend, John Lawrence, was tenderly laid away in quiet Elmwood for that last long sleep. Death to him was a relief as it was to his friends. Truly it was harder to see his suffering and note the falling of that once bright mind than to give him up in death.

MRS. DR. E. S. HICKEY DEAD

Mrs. Hickey died early Saturday morning at her home on North Steuben avenue. She had been in very poor health for a good while. The funeral was held in the Christian church, Sunday evening at 4 o'clock, Elder Kitchener preaching the sermon, and the remains were deposited in Elmwood.

Mrs. Hickey came to Chanute in 1879 with her husband from Indiana. She kept house, raised a family and studied medicine and for a number of years practiced in this locality. She leaves five children, all grown. Mrs. Hickey was 55 years old.

Jimmie Lea was one of the young brakemen from this place. He had only been on the road about a year and a half. He was a light hearted jolly young man, ever willing to do his part and more, and was a universal favorite among the boys. He was 23 years old. Thus was snuffed out in a moment a bright young life that gave promise of a useful future. The sympathy of everybody is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Lea in this sad hour.


