On last Friday morning this part of the country had the heaviest rain fall of the season with a severe wind in some localities that did some damage Saturday morning about 2:30 another destructive wind storm struck this part of the country which was more general in its scope. Much damage was done to orchards and shade trees, some orchards being almost completely ruined, trees were uprooted or blown over and tops broken out and fruit blown off. buildings in the neighborhood is but slight, no loss of live stock is reported except a guinea fowl of Dr. Iles' which was killed by the storm.
