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SPRING ELECTIONS.
 Result of Municipal Elections in Many Kansas Towns and Cities.
LAWRENCE, Kan., April 3.—The republican city ticket was the only one in the field yesterday for the city election. Following are the men elected: Mayor, A. L. Seelig; city treasurer, C. S. Duncan; police judge, L. S. Steele; treasurer of the board of education, Alice L. Litchfield; members of the board of education, J. M. Newlin and J. D. Fischer; justice of the peace, A. A. Cooper and John Charlton; constables, S. W. Noland and D. Little; members of the city council, A. Shaw, C. W. Grovesnor, William Nadelhoffer, A. N. Dunakin, J. M. G. Watt and S. S. McCann.
OLATHE, Kan., April 3.—In this city every republican candidate was elected over the combined opposition under the head of "Citizens' Reform Ticket," headed by George H. Hodges for mayor. A. E. Moll was elected mayor by 65 majority; E. C. Owen was re-elected police judge for the fourth term by 250 majority; H. A. Taylor, treasurer, by 240; Al H. Betts, treasurer board of education, without opposition; W. L. Hayes and E. L. Carress were elected justices, and J. L. Hays and John Woodworth constables by from 50 to 100 majority.

OTTAWA, Kan., April 3.—The election resulted in the election of G. G. Wharton, state chairman of the prohibition party, to the office of mayor on the independent ticket, by a majority of 4 votes. E. W. Fike was elected police judge on the same ticket, and also two councilmen and two members of the school board. With these exceptions the republican ticket was elected throughout with an average majority of 164.

HUTCHINSON, Kan., April 3.—The result of the election is as follows: Mayor Vincent was re-elected by 150 majority, while the citizens' or Vincent ticket elected four out of six aldermen.
PARSONS, Kan., April 3.—The whole republican ticket with the exception of mayor and one justice of the peace was completely snowed under. Skelton, citizens' nominee, was beaten by only a small majority. Hart, nominee for justice of the peace on the republican ticket, together with Stephens, candidate for mayor, were the only republicans elected.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., April 3.—The city election yesterday resulted in a republican victory, D. A. Hook being elected mayor over Judge Hacker by 350 majority. J. W. Hausserman was elected city attorney, A. A. Penn city treasurer; James Gray, democrat, defeated Charles Dill for city clerk. The republicans elected five out of six councilmen. There was no contest for the school board except in the First ward, where Nathan Schloss, democrat, defeated Oscar Harris, colored, republican. Michael Lonergan was the only democratic constable elected.

SALINA, Kan., April 3.—In the municipal election yesterday J. T. Hayward, republican, defeated E. W. Ober, independent, for mayor by a majority of 53 out of a total vote of 1,554. The woman vote was especially heavy.
ARCHISON, Kan., April 3.—The count has progressed far enough to show that B. P. Waggener, democratic candidate for mayor, has been elected. His majority is estimated at 1,000. The republicans will elect all other officers.

ABILENE, Kan., April 3.—The citizens' ticket was elected by 60 majority. W. J. Coye was chosen mayor over A. W. Rice, law and order. W. B. Gillis, treasurer; C. A. Hodge, treasurer school board; W. S. Anderson, judge. The women's vote was the largest ever known and the contest was a very bitter one.

ELDORADO, Kan., April 3.—The election in this city was one of the warmest that has been held for a number of years. John T. Evans, republican, has defeated A. J. Holderman, citizens', and the majority of the republican ticket is elected.
GREAT BEND, Kan., April 3.—George N. Moses, republican candidate for mayor, was elected by 77 majority over R. A. Allison, citizen. Republicans elect three members of the council which means indorsement of present city administration.

CALDWELL, Kan., April 3.—In the election held yesterday there were two tickets, straight republican and citizens'. The citizens' ticket is elected entire with a majority ranging from 100 to 150.

EMPORIA, Kan., April 3.—The city election passed off quietly, the entire republican ticket being successful, with probably two exceptions, the independents getting one councilman and one member of the school board, all by small majorities.

WICHITA, Kan., April 3.—The vote here yesterday was light. The liberal republican ticket was elected by an estimated majority of 800 over a fusion of democrats, populists and prohibitionists. Only one councilman was lost.

TOPEKA, Kan., April 3.—The entire republican ticket, headed by C. A. Fellows for mayor, is elected by over a two-thirds vote.
WELLINGTON, Kan., April 3.—W. R. Savage, the citizens' candidate was re-elected mayor in the city election by a plurality of 125, defeating W. H. Staffebach, republican, and C. J. Humphreys, municipal reform, after an exciting contest. The republicans elect a majority of the council and school board.

Four Scott, Kan., April 3.—Only two tickets, republican and citizens' were in the field. Indications now point to the election of P. C. Hasser for mayor, together with the entire republican ticket.
