A Fine Looking Body.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 1.—The populist state convention met here today. The party in 1893 cast 15,500 votes and last year 49,500. Hugo Freyer, a lead-Ohio greenbacker when the Green-back party was in existence, is chairman of the state committee and called the convention to order. The convention is a fine looking body and J. S. Coxey, the professed candidate for governor, is the center of interest.
