County Ticket but Judge Martin Loses it.

NO COURT HOUSE.

The Court House Levy Defeated and Rutledge Elected

Insures Ed. Handy a Pull for Three Years More.

A quiet election prevailed last Tuesday and the result was largely in favor of the opposition. Little or no interest was taken in the country.

The only interest taken in the city was over judgeship. Whitelaw carrying the town over Martin by 75 votes.

John Q. Patten was the vote getter on the ticket, having every string pulling his way, the prohibitionists and the city administration, working hand in hand for him.

Fay Smith is defeated by a small majority, owing to a lack of interest taken in the country. Fay carried his home ward by a good majority.

Judge Martin carried McPherson by 400 and Harvey by 324 insuring his election by about 600.

The flaxen angle had cut a figure in the defeat of Fountain and Elsmberg.

Valley, Enterprise, and Medford townships show a good gain over the vote of last year.

As we go to press the fall returns are not in, and will not be given until our next issue.

The indications point to majorities run 150 for Rutledge to 100 for Patten.

The court house levy is defeated, the country going almost solid against it. This was done in the interest of economy probably, but it means in the end that the \$1,800 yearly steal is to go on.

THE NEXT SENATE.

Resume of the Legislative Elections Where Senators Are to Be Chosen.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Great interest was manifested here in the legislative elections throughout the country, as they will materially affect the control of the United States senate. Up to yesterday the standing in the senate was as follows: Republicans, 42; democrats, 39; populists, 6; vacant (democrat), 1; total, 88. As the result of yesterday's elections the democrats will lose and the republicans will gain a senator from Maryland, Kentucky and Ohio respectively. The other legislative elections do not appear to affect the standing in the senate as Mississippi remains democratic, while Iowa continues republican. Utah chooses two United States senators for the first time, but the complexion of the legislature is not certain. The Utah senators take their seats in the senate shortly after congress assemblies. The changes in Ohio and Maryland will not affect the senate until March, 1897.

The republican majority in the next Ohio legislature, as shown by the returns from Ohio, insures the retirement of Senator Brice (dem.) and the succession of a republican. It appears to be settled that ex-Gov. Foraker will be the choice of the legislature, as the state convention placed his name in the platform as the senatorial candidate.

In Maryland the election of a republican legislature, the first in many years, will bring about the retirement of Senator Gibson and the election of a republican in his place. The election of a republican legislature in Iowa was not unexpected, and it is considered settled that Senator Allison will be elected to succeed himself.

The return of a democratic legislature in Mississippi has been a foregone conclusion. It will elect a successor to Senator George. The returns from New York and New Jersey indicate republican gains. These legislatures do not elect United States senators this year, but, as part of legislatures hold over, the present election is important in influencing these bodies which will elect successors to Senator Hill, of New York, and Senator Smith, of New Jersey, whose terms expire March 4, 1897.
