**HAVEN TOWNSHIP PROTESTS**  
Against an Increase of the Taxes by Calling a Mass Meeting of her Taxpayers who Adopt Strong Resolutions.

Saturday, Nov. 30, a number of taxpayers of Haven township met at the school house to consider the increase in taxation. The meeting was organized by the election of R. Astle as Chairman and G. S. Bishop as Secretary. After some discussion the following resolutions, introduced by Mr. C. W. Peckham, were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, It has come to our knowledge that taxation in Reno county is increased by about fifty per cent for the year 1895, over the amount levied on the same assessment in 1894, notwithstanding the fact that the prices of farm products are much lower than last year, and

Whereas, We, the taxpayers, who bear the burdens of the government, consider that any measure of expense which tends to increase our load of taxation in these times, or any other, is of vital importance to us and our interests, therefore,

Be it resolved, That we require a close and critical investigation of all increase in our burdens, and demand the most rigid and scrupulous economy in every branch of county and state government and the greatest possible care in every expenditure.

Resolved, That while the explanations at our service leave no personal criticism upon the rectitude of our board of county commissioners, we can deprecate only seeming necessity to increase the per cent rate of taxation, and we would have urged a reduction in the expenses of Reno county rather than an increase in taxation.

Resolved, That, in our opinion, the salaries of nearly all county officers are too high, and we urge upon our legislators the importance of such reduction in the salaries as shall destroy all sinecures which now exist, and place the officers' salaries upon such business footing as shall afford fair pay for competent services only.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be applied to each Reno county paper for publication, with the hope that the taxpayers may be aroused to greater and closer personal interest in affairs of local government, to the end that taxation may be speedily and appreciably reduced.
