IS A VICTORY

The People's Party Get Five Out of Eight.

The Important Offices Filled by People's Party Candidates.

The Opposition Crew, But What About Is Hard to Tell--The Alliance is Still on Earth and a Very Lively Corpse--Some Figures.

The election in Sherman county passed off quietly although there was the deepest interest possible taken in the result. It was a hand to hand conflict, (to use the military figure) and it was long foreseen that the campaign this fall would end in one of the closest and most hotly contested elections that Kansas has seen for many years.

The old parties had determined to break down the people's party movement, if possible, and so they would combine to accomplish this end. The patronage of the general government, the patronage of the state, the power of corporations, the fusion of both old parties sought to accomplish this end.

But like Hercules in the cradle strangling the serpent, this infant of the people's party has strangled the "constrictor" of this gigantic combine.

In this county the people's party gave Hopkins, for state senator a majority of 56; they elect Treasurer B. F. Brown by a majority of 246; Sheriff Kemp by 61; Coroner E. E. Burwell by 124; and Commissioner Teagarden by 52; while the fusion ticket elected County Clerk Scott by 231; Register of Deeds Hedges by 41; Surveyor Paddock by 27 majority.

The people's party elected on the township ticket A. G. Patrick treasurer, by 362, he being on both tickets. G. L. Calvert also a member of the citizen's alliance was elected justice of the peace, receiving 280 out of 378 votes. The balance of the fusion ticket was elected.

Now the people's party elected five out of eight, leaving the fusion ticket three of the county offices of the least political importance. Besides the highest majority given to any candidate, excepting the township ticket, was that of B. F. Brown--246. Now when it is remembered that the opposition made an especial fight on this candidate, the result is significant. Dr. E. E. Burwell also, although there was some misunderstanding the fore part of the day resulting in his being scratched, when the falsity of the report was found out, the tide turned the other way and he ran far ahead of the ticket, being elected coroner by 124 majority. Dr. Burwell is a thorough practitioner, and is well liked by the people.

The people's party is stronger today than ever before, and so far from dying out, has gained strength on all sides. The people's party is harmonious, well organized, has two of the best papers published in the county, and has six of the county officers and the entire board of commissioners. This is not a bad showing for the new party in this county.

The crew of the opposition is like a chicken with the crop while tears are dripping from the end of his drooping beak, feathers awry, and general appearance unhealthy.

Last year the highest number of votes cast for any alliance candidate was 723 with the support of the railroad employes and members of the democratic party. This year with both these voting elements against it they poll 616 votes. It is fair to allow also of a loss of 125 voters from the people's party by removal from the county.

The people's party in Sherman county is in splendid shape for the campaign of 1892 and with thorough organization, good leadership, and earnest work will roll up a rousing majority for the cause. We propose to begin the campaign at once and will "carry the war into Africa." Please do not fail to remember we are enlisted for the campaign of 1892.

We will record one other significant fact. Last year with the railroad element voting with the alliance, they had 84 majority on secretary of state

over both old parties; while this year with both old parties against them and with the former support largely against them, and especial effort being made to defeat the people's party by corporation influence, they gave a majority of 56 on state senator. Does this look as though the movement was dying out?

Review of great battles is as profitable study for all who wish to forecast probabilities in coming campaigns. Position of "stars" are not as good

THE CAPITAL NEWS

War News at the Seat of Government the Principle Topic.

The President and Secretary Blaine in Favor of Settling the Chilean Trouble by Arbitration--A Reciprocity Agreement.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 2.--War, grim visaged and red-handed, has for several days been the burden of the songs sang by the sensation mongers and young naval officers who have never smelt any powder except that on the faces of society bells; and no story has been too absurd to find credence, one will do for example--that in order to get even with the Chilean junta, the administration had determined to recognize Senor Vicuna, now a fugitive in this country, who was elected president of Chili just previous to the demise of the Balmaceda government, and to send him back to that country with a squadron of our best ships and a military force strong enough to enable him to assure the office to which he was elected. How is that for absurdity? Those who know best the real situation of affairs have no fear between Chili and the United States. Even granting that there was cause sufficient for this country to attack Chili, there would still be little danger of war; because President Harrison and Secretary Blaine are both on record as ardent advocates for the settlement of all international disputes which cannot be disposed of by the ordinary methods of diplomacy by arbitration. It will be remembered that the pan-American congress, when in session here last year also passed a resolution pledging the nations it represented to adopt arbitration for the settlement of disputes. The Chilean representatives to that congress refused, however, to vote for that resolution or to be bound by it.

Secretary Blaine has been assured by Senor Montt, the Chilean minister here who is in constant communication with the junta, that the investigation requested by this government of the attack upon our sailors is being made and that if it shall show that the Chileans were to blame they will do the right thing; but it is plain, from private advices received here, the purpose of the investigation is to make it appear that the affair was only a common street brawl for which the Chilean government cannot accept any responsibility. At present Chili is occupying the familiar position of the small boy who makes faces at the big one relying upon the disparity in their sizes for protection, and Great Britain appears to be playing the role of the boy who nudges the little fellow on the sly and whispers: "Do it again; if he hits you we will call him a coward." It is stated by those close to the administration that there is no likelihood of Minister Egan being recalled at present. It is not expected that any further steps will be taken by this government until the Chilean junta has had a reasonable time to complete the investigation and report its result, and it is not unlikely that the whole matter may go over until the permanent government, recently elected shall succeed the present temporary government of Chili. The new officials will be installed this month.

It is evident from the announcement by the officials of the department of state that delegates from Barbadoe and Trinidad are soon to come here to negotiate a reciprocity agreement, that England has agreed for the West India colonies to reciprocate with the United States; indeed it is supposed that these delegates will have full power to conclude such an argument. Mr. Blaine is also said to be confident that the reciprocity agreement which have been in negotiation for some time with Mexico, Columbia, Venezuela and Peru will shortly be accomplished facts.

All of the matured one-half per cents have been extended or redeemed except about \$4,000,090 and they are coming in at the rate of about \$20,000 a day.

The gossips are not so positive that Commissioner Baum is to go since the resignation of the second one of the three men that he asked to have dismissed has been accepted by Secretary Noble.
