UNSUCCESSFUL ATTEMPT AT LYNCHING.

Sunday morning at about 3 o'clock, Sheriff Hays was awakened by some one calling him, and hastily dressing he went to the hall of the jail; at the foot of the stairs, and within the hall stood four men covering him with rifles and demanding the body of McKinney, the colored murderer. Going to his room he returned with his revolver and accompanied by his brave daughter walked defiantly down stairs. As he did this the would-be-lynchers backed out the door. The sheriff then went to the front of the building and made a short address, telling the men that they should never get the prisoner unless they walked over his dead body. Completely cowed the body of men left, vowing however that they would get McKinney. The valiant sheriff informed them that he would be in jail until his trial, and also that he himself would be there ready to receive them whenever they should come.

The lynching party was composed principally of colored persons, and numbered about fifty. They had come from Valley Center and neighborhood and a few from even as far as Newton.

Deputy Sheriff Donnelly paid Mr. Barger a visit yesterday, hoping to read to him a warrant that might interest him. On arriving at his usual place of abode he was given the dodge and his first sight of the lad found him near fifty yards away and going at a 2:30 gait.
