Japan's Wooden Water Pipes. The water supply of Tokyo, Japan, is by the wooden water pipe system, which has been in existence over 300 years, furnishing at present a daily supply of from twenty-five to thirty million gallons. There are several types of water pipes in use, the principal being built up with plank, square, and secured together by frames surrounding them at close intervals. The pipes less than six inches consist of bored logs, and somewhat larger ones are made by placing a cap on the top of a log in which a very large groove has been cut. All the connections are made by channeled joints, and cracks are caulked with an inner fibrous bark. Square boxes are used in various places to regulate the uniformity of the flow of the water, which is rather rapid, for the purpose of preventing aquatic growth. The water is not delivered to the house, but into reservoirs on the sides of the streets, nearly 15,000 in number.—Scientific American.
