CLOSE AT HAND.

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KILLED BY HER LOVER.

A Servant Girl Foundly Slain at Lexington, Ky.

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 1.—Betty Shea, a servant girl in the family of John H. Woolfolk, was found murdered in her room in the Woolfolk mansion early this morning by another servant who went to call her.

The room gave evidence of a desperate struggle, and her night gown and undergarments were torn in many places. Her skull was crushed in with some blunt instrument, and her head and body were badly bruised.

Other servants state that Betty Shea had been talking for a long time about being married soon, and Sunday told one of them she and O'Brien would probably be married Sunday night.

O'Brien was under arrest on the ground that he had been with the woman early in the night but afterwards denied having been there at all Sunday night.

The coroner's inquest Dr. Long testified that one month ago O'Brien wanted him to furnish him medicine to produce an abortion on Betty Shea, who was pregnant.

Several damaging notes from O'Brien to the murdered woman were produced as evidence. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict holding O'Brien as the murderer.

Various theories are advanced, the principal one being that the woman last night insisted on O'Brien marrying her as he promised, which led to a quarrel and ended in murder.

O'Brien murdered a young man named Metcalf in a saloon night a year ago but was acquitted on the ground of self-defense. He will attempt to prove an alibi in this case.

Public excitement was running high today and O'Brien was quietly removed from the city prison to the county jail.

CHICAGO, April 1.—The Chicago and Alton stockholders met today in annual session and unanimously re-elected the old board of directors officers of the company.

The only vacancy was that caused by the death of Lorenzo Blackstone. The position was filled by the election of the late director's son, William N. Blackstone.

Old officers were re-elected at a subsequent meeting. A meeting of stockholders was also held of the Joliet and Chicago road, Mississippi River Bridge company, St. Louis, Rock Island and Chicago road and Alton & St. Louis road, all under the Alton's management.

The old directors of each of these organizations were unanimously re-elected.

TRAINLOADS OF FREIGHT.

Vast Accumulations of Goods Bound for Oklahoma at Border Stations.

ARKANSAS CITY, Kan., April 1.—Nearly one hundred car loads of freight, consisting of stock, household goods and implements have arrived here within the last two days to be forwarded to Oklahoma on the 23d inst.

The freight is the result of the fact that the full capacity of the line is taxed to its full capacity, and by the 20th of this month seventy-five men will be employed in that department, so says the agent.

It is estimated that it will take about one hundred trains to move the accumulation of freight south when the date arrives. The company is putting every facility in the hands of its agents, and their agents, to meet every needed demand.

Several hundred boomed arrived today. A BLOODY SEQUEL. A Negro Shot at Plummerville, Ark., while Tracking Clayton's Assassins.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 1.—News reached this city Sunday night of a murder which occurred a mile east of Plummerville, Saturday evening, about 6 o'clock. Joe R. Smith, a negro, was shot and killed by one Dave Richmond, a young white man.

It seems Smith had been to Plummerville and was on his way home when he was overtaken by Richmond, who was on horseback, and shot down.

There were witnesses to the affray and particulars about it are meagre, but it seems that Richmond fired three shots at Smith, the first of which struck him in the breast near the heart, and was enough in itself to kill him.

The shooting was witnessed by some men who were at work in the field near the place where the negro was seen to throw up his hands and then fall. Richmond turned and rode back towards Plummerville, and meeting a wagon in the road, dismounted and got into it.

Some deputy sheriffs came upon him this time, arrested Richmond and took him to Morrilton, where he is now in jail awaiting his examining trial which will take place Wednesday.

Smith and Richmond are not known to have had any previous trouble, and the killing is a mystery. It is ascertained for this way: That Smith has been employed by Pinkerton detectives who are in this city to work up the evidence against the men who stole the bank loot boxes at Plummerville, and also John M. Clayton's assassins. He, it has been learned, had been doing some talking at Plummerville about his discovery of the money, and this was the cause of his death.

Further reason for the killing is that Clayton is a letter writer, and Smith wrote to the detectives Saturday, and which was received by him Sunday morning, and which reads as follows: The money is all here. You must have it. I am trying to find out where they are. One of them saw the shooting. I wish it was I could see you. I am now working on the case. I am now working on the case.
