SWEEPING CHANGES.

THE NAVY DEPARTMENT WILL BE RE-ORGANIZED.

The Cherokee Commission Will Hold Its Preliminary Meeting on Saturday Next.

Attorney General Miller Decides That no National Banks Can be Organized at Muskogee.

Matters of Interest to Kansans at the Capital—Postal Changes for the Territory—The War Department Ordered Draped in Mourning Out of Respect to the Late Hon. Simon Cameron.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—By a sweeping general order issued today Secretary Tracy requested an entire reorganization of the navy department.

Up to this time new equipment and new duties, constantly arising from the conditions of the old wooden vessels with new ships and modern guns, have been assigned here and there to the several bureaus of the department, often with no better reason than the convenience of the moment.

SHOCKING FATALITIES.

SIX KANSAS CITYANS MEET DEATH IN A DAY.

A Laborer's Head Torn to Fragments by the Unexpected Explosion of a Blast.

Three Small Boys Drowned While Bathing—Two Men Fatally Overcome by Sewer Gas.
