SENATE SILVER RESOLUTION.  
Whereas, The recent action of the senate of the United States in promptly passing the free coinage of silver bill, is a move in the direction of restoration of prices and prosperity to the agricultural industry; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Senate of the state of Kansas urge upon the national House of Representatives prompt concurrence in the passage of the Senate silver bill; that this body, representing the Republicans of Kansas, respectfully but earnestly request our delegation in Congress to insist, in the interest of the country and the welfare of the Republican party in the west, upon the passage of the bill and its approval by the Republican executive, as being in line with Republican pledges.

Resolved, That the secretary of the Senate is hereby instructed to transmit a copy of these resolutions to each member of the Kansas delegation in Congress.

There is some talk of holding the meeting at Dayton's grove, on the Chikaskia, but that has not been definitely determined upon as yet. But keep your eye on the fact that September 1 is the date, place announced later. Don't let a single one of your neighbors remain away because he had not heard of it.

We fear the Republicans may miss their guess on some of the colored men they are enticing to Kansas. One of them came in Tuesday and subscribed for the VOICE. Said he had heard so much talk about this Alliance business that he wanted to post up and see what good it was.

They say that Whittinghill, Republican candidate for county attorney has a very smooth way of working for farmer's votes. He kisses all the babies, draws wash water for their mammas and also fans the flies off the cows while their papas are milking. You'll know him by the way he acts when he comes around to see you.

The Monitor-Press, after having helped to elect an alleged Prohibitory city administration, which has utterly failed to enforce the law in Wellington, is now trying to shoulder the responsibility of its non-enforcement on the County Attorney. As we have said before, Mr. Pool's shoulders are broad and he is able to bear it.

The Omaha printers have organized a People's party club with a membership of fifty. The primary object of the club is to secure the nomination and election of men known to be in hearty sympathy with trades unionism. Two-thirds of the members are Republicans who have bolted the nomination of Whitelaw Reid. It is claimed that two-thirds of the union printers of Omaha will become members of the club.

The Republican party, by its claim that bad crops gave birth to the People's party, thus transfers the responsibility of the Almighty. And when a year of plenty strikes us and we produce ten cent corn, they again arraign the Almighty by laying the cause to "over-production." Sensible people are discovering that the trouble is not with the Almighty, but with ourselves.

The Republican central committee met in Wellington Saturday and claims the credit of the rain on that day. The townships in the north part of the county where they didn't get any, have a just grievance which they will settle at the polls in November. And the balance of the county will want to know why the blasphemous outfit didn't send it two weeks sooner.

The word has gone out from Republican headquarters to "claim everything," "concede nothing." There is a two-fold purpose in this: (1) To inspire confidence in the rank and file and strengthen the weak knees of the doubting Thomases (?); (2) to cover up contemplated frauds. When you hear the "moguls" making these unreasonable boasts, just consider the "why" of it.

Frank Walling, the enterprising young publisher of the Caldwell Journal, proposes to issue a special edition of three thousand copies for the purpose of booming Sumner county. Frank is a young man of good rustling qualities and we hope he may receive lots of encouragement in his enterprise. Merchants of Wellington should avail themselves of the opportunities offered by this special edition.

It is a pretty stale chestnut, that story about the People's party being wafted in by the hot winds. As a matter of fact the Alliances were nearly all organized and the agitation against the unequal conditions had its birth in a year of plenty when corn went down to ten cents per bushel. The fact that farmers could burn corn as cheap or cheaper than they could ship it out and ship coal in, set them to thinking.

Geo. R. Peck is general solicitor for the Santa Fe railroad company. Chester I. Long is a local attorney in Peck's office, and is now the Santa Fe's local attorney. We are told, Peck wants to go to the senate and Long wants to go to congress. But of course, it is not to be expected that the Santa Fe railroad company would condescend to aid them in their laudable ambition. Railroad companies never meddle with politics.

Republican papers hoot at the idea of negro colonization and call people "silly" who intimate it. It will take a more substantial proof than this to convince the people that their suffrage is in no danger of such outrage. We have been called "silly"

oftentimes before, but we've always had lots of company. These local sheets may be as ignorant of the plan as the negroes, and yet it may be true. The effort now is to get them into the state, where they will be expected to rustle for themselves until election day, then they will be cared for. With free transportation and good rustling qualities the negroes will not be so very much expense to the committee as one might think. Looks "silly" doesn't it?

The People's party voters of Palestine township will organize a People's party club and prepare for some good times up there this fall. A complete outfit of singing books will be ordered and a good glee club will be formed. Other townships not already organized would do well to follow the example of Palestine.

The Monitor gives as a reason for the rise of the "calamity party" in the west and northwest that the farmers "who were struggling to make for themselves and families homes upon the lands the Republican party had given them under the provisions of the homestead and pre-emption laws, were poor. The failure of each succeeding crop," it says, "reduced them financially lower until in their desperation they were willing to believe that the government, and especially the Republican party, was responsible for their misfortunes." We have never yet seen a "calamity paper" which so grossly slandered Kansas. This editorial assumes that every crop has been a failure since the settlers came here, when everybody knows that Kansas has proverbially turned out more grain than any other state in the union. "Stand up for Kansas!"
