

**John Temple Graves.**

John Temple Graves delivered his famous lecture on "Uncle Tom's Last Cabin" at the auditorium Monday night it being the last attraction of the course. Mr. Graves' lecture was somewhat in the nature of a surprise to those who expected to hear a "popular" lecture in the sense in which that word is generally accepted. The theme and leading idea of his talk was the present condition and the ultimate political and moral state of the negro race. He described the negro as he was when by the proclamation of President Lincoln the shackles of slavery were forever broken and the African stood among his white brothers a free man and the political equal of the Anglo-Saxon race. He then described him as he is and from his deductions he proved that the experiment to educate and civilize this unfortunate race while mixing and mingling promiscuously with the superior race by which they were surrounded had proved a dismal failure both as to the civilizing influences upon the colored race and the effect upon the industries of the south.

The people in the south he said laid aside all differences of political opinion in an effort to hold the negro in subjection and until a change occurred by which the negro was disfranchised or transported the "solid" south would remain unbroken, a curse to our fair land and a serious menace to the life of the government itself. And while it was a fact the movement which finally liberated from slavery the African race in America originated in the north, yet the prejudice against this people was not confined to sections or even countries, but was universal wherever the history of their lives was known. As an instance, the white people of this country almost unanimously, regardless of sectional boundary lines less than sixteen months ago applauded to the echo the successful overthrow of the negro Hawaiian government by the predominant and ruling power of the white man.

As a panacea for the ills pictured he boldly advocated the foundation of a new state to be occupied, owned and ruled wholly by the negro race. He would select from the public domain if possible a body of land measuring about 50 millions of acres and at the expense of the government arrange irrigating appliances and all other expenditures necessary to the health and prosperity of its inhabitants and then in this land of promise he would offer free homes to the negro race and as an extra inducement to immigration he would here make the colored man entirely free from the competition of the white man by excluding all but negroes from the right of suffrage or the right to hold property. At the close of his speech he invited the audience to take part in the discussion of the plan as outlined and he answered and explained every question asked, stating at the time that they were only his individual ideas and were questions which could be settled only after experiments had been made. Mr. Graves by his earnest eloquence and evidently sincerity of purpose gained the complete sympathy of his audience regardless of political or other differences of opinion and it was pronounced by all who heard it as an able plea for the betterment of the condition of the African race in America.
