The Kansas City Journal says: "THE ROCK ISLAND'S NEW TRAIN."  
To-morrow morning at 9:50 o'clock the Rock Island route, Chicago, Kansas & Nebraska railway, will start its first train to Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo. The train is of the vestibule style, the claim being made that its cars are the finest ever turned out of the Pullman establishment. The officers of the road have issued an invitation to the public to inspect the train before its departure, and quite a crowd will make the trip to Topeka and back, the schedule giving two hours and a half there, and landing excursionists at home before 6 p. m. The train has been dubbed "The President," and will receive a royal welcome at the west end of the run, every town from Denver to Pueblo, and from Kansas to Colorado Springs having made preparations to receive it with a demonstration. The first "President" east bound will arrive in Kansas City Monday morning. The new road will be formally opened on Sunday with this new train. On November 27th the company will run an excursion from Kansas City and St. Joseph to Denver, tickets good for fifteen days. The vestibule train will split at Altamont Mo., one section coming to this city and the other going by way of St. Joseph. They will be reunited at Belleville, Kas., and run through to Denver."
