William Eckel, of Phoenix, will spend the next two years and six months of his life in Yuma if the sentence of the court, pronounced against him, for kidnaping his two year old niece is carried into effect. Eckel tried to make it appear that he was crazy but the jury decided that he had enough sense to appreciate a residence in Yuma within prison walls.

The November number of 10 Story Book is at hand. In the way of a cover novelty it has the feature of the lost foot on a herring skeleton in white on a field of lusterful blue. The contents are of equal if not greater merit than is found in this popular magazine. Such names as Elizabeth Phillips Train, H. S. Canfield, William Hamilton Osborne, Ada C. W. O. Kellner, postmaster at Globe, has just returned over to the United States \$3000, the amount of money stolen some time since from the safe in the postoffice. Mr. Kellner had failed to properly lock the safe hence the loss. The safe in question had been properly locked and broken open by the government who have stood the loss. The thief stole considerable property belonging to Mr. Kellner, besides this \$3000.

At Memphis, on Thursday, Dan Patch, the pacer cut the pacing record down to 1:56.1-4 thus beating his own record by about two seconds, and cutting the pacing record down to three quarters of a second. The trial was made with two runners to set the pace, the sulky preceding the pacer carrying a canvas strip between the wheels. Lou Dillon trotted over the same course today in an attempt to lower the trotting record.

The United States civil service commission announces that, in order to give those who were unable to enter the October 19-20 examination, an opportunity to be examined, another examination will be held on November 18-19 for teacher, male, in the south. Persons who were not present at the October 19-20 examination or whose applications were received too late to arrange for their examination on October 19-20 will be notified to appear for the November examination.

A Chinese deportation case was decided recently in Cleveland, which it is said will practically nullify the Chinese expulsion act if it is allowed to stand. Judge Wing of the United States court rendered the decision and he held that identification was not individual but one of race. The language of the law is that no Chinese person shall be permitted to enter within the territorial limits of the United States, and the court practically decided that the detained persons were of the Chinese race. So far as the evidence was submitted, the three men might be Koreans, or members of another race. In consequence of this ruling the three prisoners were discharged.

A general order just issued by the chief of the general staff of the army tells of the conditions under which an enlisted man may purchase his discharge. In time of peace, a soldier seeking to purchase his discharge is to be given the opportunity to do so within the first six months of the third year of his first enlistment, may apply to the adjutant general of the army, through military channels, for the privilege of purchasing his discharge. If such application is granted the soldier will not be discharged until he has received the purchase price of the government, including the price of purchase. Should the credits be insufficient he is to be given the opportunity to make a sum sufficient to complete the amount necessary. The soldier may then be discharged. The price of purchase in the first month of the second year will be \$120, and will be \$5 less in each succeeding month of the period during which purchase may be authorized.

INDICTMENT ON ELEVEN COUNTS

Is What Confronts Two Ex-Officials.

Grand Jury in Phoenix Returns True Bills Against Price and Murphy.

Hugh H. Price, formerly surveyor general for Arizona, and W. E. Murphy, formerly chief clerk to the surveyor general, both of whom were recently removed from office by the secretary of the interior, were indicted yesterday afternoon by the United States grand jury, on eleven counts, charging them with extortion, accepting bribes and conspiracy to commit an offense against the government of the United States. Messrs. Price and Murphy were indicted jointly, both being charged with the same offenses, and will be tried jointly, probably next week. They will plead to all the complaints, Saturday.

Although there were eleven different charges against them, the court only required a bond of \$200 each on one of the charges, their word being sufficient in the other cases. Bonds were readily furnished by both. Thomas Armstrong Jr., signing that of Mr. Price and Eugene Brady O'Neill and Tom Smith going surety for Mr. Murphy.

Fire of the indictments were for accepting bribes, the alleged facts being as follows:

On the 24th day of June 800 from George R. Hill, which influenced their action as regards the ordering of mineral survey No. 1871.

On the 28th day of January, 1903, \$200 from Frank H. Hereford, influencing their action in the Babocomari and Del Valle grants.

Each accepting a bribe of \$75 from W. A. Cline influencing their action in ordering work on mineral survey No. 178.

On the 16th day of September from George R. Hill, \$510, influencing their action on mineral survey No. 1638; on July 3rd from Emma Miller, \$400, influencing their action on mineral survey Nos. 178-50 and 1800.

Five of the indictments were for extorting money under the color of their office and allege the following:

On the 30th day of July, \$300 from Albert Steinfeld;

Sept. 8, 1902, \$100 from E. Block. A case in which no fees or sum was due;

July 20, 1902, \$130 from C. E. Taylor;

June 30th, 1903, \$100 from E. J. Bennett;

October 13th, 1903, \$180 from Isaac T. Stoddard.

The indictment for conspiring to commit an offense against the government alleges the act was committed on the 20th day of January, 1903, and preceded the date a letter was written to J. J. Hawkins of Prescott, stating that on the payment of \$200, they could get certain work on mining claims.—Phoenix Gazette.

New Range Officer.

Governor Brodie has appointed Sergeant William D. Allison of the Arizona Rangers lieutenant of that organization, to succeed Lieutenant Foster, who resigned to accept the appointment of deputy United States marshal. The appointment was made on the recommendation of Captain Thomas Rynning of the rangers.

The new lieutenant has a long and good record as a peace officer in this territory, Texas and New Mexico. He was sheriff of Milledge county, Texas, for ten years and was first sergeant of the Texas Rangers under the famous Captain Hughes for one enlistment of two years.

He was inspector of the Texas Cattle Raisers' association for three years and was deputy sheriff of Chavez county, N. M.

He enlisted in the Arizona Rangers last April and was appointed to be sergeant.
