TELLURIUM CAMP MAY SURPASS GOLD FIELD

Picture Value Ore Found In New Mexico Just Out Of Arizona

BISBEE, Oct. 9.—Many mining men in Bisbee and the Warren district are much interested in reports which have come from the new gold district of Hachita in New Mexico, just across the Arizona boundary line. According to J. B. Rice, the well known commercial traveling man who was in Bisbee for a few hours yesterday, the new camp bids fair to rival Goldfields and Rawline, the famous Nevada camps, and Cripple Creek, in Colorado.
 According to Rice, the new camp is a tellurium proposition and very rich. Rice brought with him some very fine specimens of gold ore and dust which he panned himself. He declares that the ore is in every respect similar to that which has made Cripple Creek the greatest camp in the world.
 "The rush to Hachita last spring failed because the prospectors who rushed in and took up claims did not understand the tellurium ores," Rice said in conversation with a reporter.
 "Many of those who went in got fine panings, but the assays were bad and the excitement died out. The camp might have remained dead had not some old Cripple Creek miners drifted there and recognized the tellurium. Samples were sent to Denver and returned as high as thirteen ounces to the ton."
 "Sol Camp, formerly superintendent of the Elkton mine at Cripple Creek, and Marvin Isa, who operated in that district, have taken up a large number of claims, and they are getting them ready to lease out, much of it having already been cut up for the leasers. Arthur Philbrick, a mining engineer from Rawhide, is also a late arrival, and he believes that Sylvanite will equal, if not surpass, Goldfield in gold production in a short time. Camp is getting ready to ship his first car of ore, which should net him between \$2,000 and \$3,000. On Camp's ground alone, 1000 leasers can begin doing business at once.
 "A man named Wood has driven a tunnel which at present has a depth of 150 feet, and the face of the tunnel is in ore that will run \$30 to \$50 to the ton. W. F. Nihart of Douglas, has shipped three cars of the ore that netted him \$30 a ton."
 Rice added that no attempt has been made to boom the new camp and none will be made. He states that the ground will be let out to leasers. A number of Bisbee miners last night wired requests for information to N. A. Berry, formerly superintendent of the Old Dominion at Globe, who is said to be on the ground.

SONORA RICH MINING FIELD. Sale Involving Big Money Gives an Impetus to the District.

BISBEE, Oct. 9.—"I have great faith in the mining field below Douglas and believe that it will be a great resource for this city." This was the statement of W. H. Brody yesterday in speaking of the future of the Smelter City. "I am fully convinced that in no distant day that section will take on a new activity and the mines and prospects which have been quiet and working a few or no men will be alive with industry and will be one of the greatest mining districts in all of the southwest.
 "The sale of the Lucky Tiger mine for the large sum of six and a half millions will be a surprise as well as an impetus to eastern investors. They will realize that there are great mines there and will direct their attentions in that direction. Capital is looking for investment and as soon as they find a locality where investments have been made and great mining properties exist there is where they will go. With the sale of the Lucky Tiger which will in all probability be made before the first of the year will also come to the front many of the prospects in that district and we may look for a new revival of the mining industry at once."

DEPTH SHOWS RICH ORE IN SHAFT OF EMPORIA

'Hundred and Ten' Ledge Gives Promise Of Fancy Value

As depth is gained in the new shaft on the Emporia mine the ore body shows improvement in size and values. The shaft is now 150 feet deep. In the last few feet, one foot of the four foot pay streak has changed to sulphide ore of a high grade. Development is at present confined to the sinking of the shaft which it is the intention to carry down several hundred feet before any extensive lateral work is started.
 The mine is owned by the Emporia Consolidated Mining Company. It is located seven miles south of this city on the Prescott and Senator stage road. It is known to old residents as the "Hundred and Ten" ledge. Pioneer prospectors and miners extracted some very high grade gold ore from shallow shafts sunk on its rich outcrops. Its development was never attempted in a minerlike way until it passed into the possession of the Emporia company a few months ago.
 The Emporia Consolidated Mining Company is also prospecting work on the Etta mine in the Black Hills district. The Etta is one of the oldest locations in the Black Hills and was among the producers a quarter of a century ago when the nearest railroad point was Ash Fork. The company intends to carry down the Etta shaft several hundred feet deeper and open the ledge, which is among the most promising gold propositions in the Black Hills range.

DESIRES STRANGE MINERALS. Commission Now Has Plenty of the Commoner Kinds of Ore.

(From Friday's Daily.)
 All exhibits to the fourth Arizona Fair which opens November 9 and closes November 14, should be carefully marked, if more than one exhibit or class of ore is sent from the same mine, or from various mines owned by the same owner or company. The same class of minerals should be marked with the same number; that is to say, all pieces from one vein carrying the same value should be marked No. 1, if different from the same vein No. 2, and so on; but if only one exhibit is sent from a mine and another exhibit is sent from another claim owned by the same party or company, the first might be marked No. 1 and the second No. 2, to identify them.
 A letter should accompany the minerals sent by a party or company, and in this letter should be the numbers corresponding with the ore or exhibit. Each number should be followed by the county, the district, the owner, the name of the mine and the values.
 All exhibits in this department, denoted as permanent exhibits, will be transported free from any railroad point in Arizona. The ores should be boxed, or, if the specimens are large, covered with burlap, so that they may be transported and handled without being damaged; and all the prospector or company will have to do is to box and ship their mineral to J. C. Goodwin, Manager Mineral Department Arizona Fair, Phoenix, Arizona. Mark "Mineral Exhibit" and send the freight bill collect and they will take care of it at this end.
 Ore should be accompanied by a sample of the hanging and foot wall. Each exhibit should be from 12 to 14 inches long, about 6 inches thick and 8 inches wide, though exhibits either larger or smaller will be accepted, but the best display will be made if all are about the size mentioned above.
 Where there are rich streaks of ore running through gang, a better display will be made by sending the ore associated with the gang than to break it up to try to show rich streaks.
 All minerals will be given a prominent position and labeled in such a manner that they can be found immediately.
 All private exhibits placed on exhibition in this department will be carefully guarded and returned after the fair.
 The commission is desirous of supplementing the minerals already received for exhibition at the Arizona Territorial Fair, and of having represented in this department all the minerals found within the territory of Arizona. Most of the common minerals are represented, but it is the desire

to have more of the rare minerals such as molybdenum, tungsten, vanadium, quick silver ores and any other that Arizona produces.
