### Jackson Productivity Breaks All Records For Speed In Replenishing Earth

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Dec. 23.—His complaint that the waiting room of the railroad station at Boynton, Okla., was not warm on a recent bitter cold night, led to the discovery that J. M. Jackson and his wife were the parents of fourteen children, thirteen of whom were born in three years.

Jackson, however, says the health of the entire family was impaired by the lack of warmth of the waiting room.

## CALIFORNIA'S NEW LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 24.—California is to be reappointed. At midnight the senate launched into its last oratorical fight for the acceptance of the Free conference report, which was adopted earlier in the evening by the house. It gives three cities nineteen senators and thirty-six assemblymen. Its passage has been conceded in the senate.

Senatorial—Santa Barbara, 25; Ventura, 29; Los Angeles, 31 and 33 to 38; Inyo, Mono-San Bernardino, 30; Tulare-Kern, 32; Riverside-Imperial, 39; San Diego, 40.

## JACK JOHNSON ANTI-AMERICAN HOME FROM EUROPE EXHIBITION IS DENIED

CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—John Arthur Johnson, the world's heavyweight champion prizefighter, arrived home today from Europe, displaying the world's tiniest watch, the world's largest squirrel fur coat, the world's greatest supply of gold teeth and issued a statement. It said:  
"Don't you think John Arthur is broke?" Later he amplified this by saying he started the "broke" story himself so as to be in a position to demand big purses in England. Three new automobiles, each guaranteed to do a hundred miles an hour will be in my garage in a week, he said. Johnson is not out of condition so far as appearance is concerned. He said he could train down in a month but would not fight unless given a purse of thirty thousand dollars. If he can't get this he will wear diamonds instead of trunks.  
An effort to interest the champion in Jim Flynn brought a laugh. He said he did not consider Flynn seriously and neither could Johnson see anything promising in any of the other white fighters. Sam Langford, he said, was the only man who really could put up a good fight, "and he is sure to be licked."

## Conspiracy is Alleged In Connection With Road Bonds

### Denies Any Wrong Intention, Saying He Had Tried To Protect Credit

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Dec. 23.—In a cross complaint filed here today, state superintendent of banks, Williams, accused William S. Tevis, a fifteen times millionaire of San Francisco of a conspiracy to defraud the Kern Valley bank.

Tevis is accused because of his alleged connections with the Sunset Road and Oil company and it is asserted that he conspired to so increase the bonded indebtedness of the company that the securities given to him to secure the indebtedness to the bank of H. A. Blodgett, depreciated in value more than one-third.  
According to the cross complaint, Blodgett owed the bank more than \$200,000. Tevis gave the bank all bonds of a face value of \$240,000 to secure this. The bond became involved in difficulties and Williams took charge last May. Tevis denies any wrong and says he pledged securities in the company to protect the bank for Blodgett's debt.

## HIGH GRADING IS DEALT SEVERE REVERSE
