## PHOENIX.

### Persistent Burglar.

The county authorities would like to fall afoul of a man in Phoenix who has formed a bad habit. It is that of robbing Brown's store at Scottsdale which was burglarized on Saturday night for the third time within the last four months. It is believed that the burglaries have all been committed by the same man and that he is a resident of this city.

## TUCSON.

### Quarantine Lifted.

Dr. H. E. Crepin, city health officer, has raised the quarantine against the two cases of infantile paralysis and declares all danger of contagion in the city is ended. Sunday schools and other places will now be open to all children.

### Medal for Bravery.

According to the Army and Navy Journal, a medal of honor has been awarded to Captain J. E. Gaujot, first cavalry, for his gallant conduct at Douglas, Arizona, on April 13, 1911, when he rescued five American prisoners and thirty Mexican soldiers from annihilation by the insurgents.

### Clothier Gets Offer.

Professor R. W. Clothier, head of the department of agriculture in the University, has been offered the position of state leader for Texas in the division of farm management,

in the United States department of agriculture. The offer comes as a result of a civil service examination in which Professor Clothier headed the list of eligibles secured by the examination.

Professor Clothier refused an extremely fine offer to enter the city schools of Los Angeles during the summer, but he has not given out a statement yet as to what he will do with the present offer.

### Over State on Motor Bike.

Prof. Robert Goodrich, of the metallurgical department of the University of Arizona, returned Thursday from his motorcycle trip over the southern section of the state. Professor Goodrich was gone for five weeks, visited all of the big towns in the south, traveled over 500 miles and took 18 dozen pictures while on the road. He used an Indian twin cylinder motorcycle and had no serious trouble any place on the road with it.

## DOUGLAS.

### Try to Smuggle Arms.

Julio Moreno, a lieutenant in the Mexican federal garrison stationed in Agua Prieta, was arrested yesterday noon, with Esteben Vasquez and Gregorio Gonzales, on the charge of conspiracy to smuggle rifles into Mexico in violation of the President's proclamation.

The arrest was made at the U. S. custom house by federal officers when the trio attempted to pass by, driving as far as possible from the building. When taken before Commissioner Sames their bond was set at \$300 each. Moreno was able to secure the amount, but his companions, a private soldier of the garrison and a hack driver, were put in jail.

Three rifles were confiscated, two Spanish Mausers and one of German make.

### Hanks Pardoned.

L. C. Hanks, formerly cashier of the First National bank of this city, sentenced to serve five years in the territorial prison upon the charge of embezzlement and falsifying the records of the institution, has been pardoned by the President. This news was received here yesterday in a private letter. Mr. Hanks' plans are not known, but it is thought that he will probably go to California.

### Cochise Registration.

The total registration of Cochise county up to time of closing registration books for the primary election was 4,661 voters. This figure is expected to be brought close to 8,000 before the final closing of the register for the presidential election. These figures have been given out by County Recorder Owen E. Murphy.

### Forged Passport.

Alenjenido Vega, husband of Francisco Villeral, who resides in Douglas and is well known, left yesterday for Hermosillo, via Cananea. The officers, after Vega had left the port of Agua Prieta, discovered that he entered under a forged passport and sent a small detachment after him to place him under arrest.

When they found him he had under his possession 74 horses, with brands from different ranches. The officers left the stolen property in charge of a ranch and are taking Vega to Hermosillo to place him in the state penitentiary to await trial.

## BISBEE.

### Got Too Profane.

George Nelson reported to Night Officer Brooks early last night that he had been robbed of \$180 in the Silver King saloon on Brewery gulch. He said that the man who got his bank roll pretended to be his friend and having gained his confidence relieved him of his money. He gave a description of the man and the officers are looking for him.

Later in the evening Nelson himself was arrested on the charge of disturbing the peace of Brewery gulch. He grew too profanely profuse in his denunciation of the man who had robbed him and an officer took him to jail. Nelson boasted that he was from Texas and would wrestle a grizzly at catch weights.

## GLOBE.

### Want Convicts to Build Road.

A petition is being circulated in Globe requesting Governor Hunt to have convicts build the uncompleted eight miles of road between Stanley and Aravaipa, on the edge of the Crook National Forest in Graham county. The petition recites that

the building of this stretch will connect with the road running south as far as Douglas and north to San Carlos and will reduce the distance from railroad facilities by forty miles.

Should this road be built it would be an outlet for mines in the Aravaipa and Stanley Butte mining districts, which form an area 25 miles long and five miles wide.

The road has already been surveyed and the survey map is on file in the office of the state engineer.

The petition has hundreds of signatures of Arizonians attached to it.

## PARKER.

### Big Mine Merger.

It is announced that within the next few months a smelting plant costing \$1,000,000 will be begun in the Riverside mountains, about six miles from Calzona and fifteen miles from Parker, on the California side of the Colorado river. The Republic Smelting Corporation, capitalized at \$7,500,000 has just been incorporated for this purpose, and it is claimed the backers of the enterprise have ample capital to carry out the extensive mining and smelting operations contemplated.

### Mine Financed.

Word has been received from C. W. Mitchell the past week to the effect that he has succeeded in financing the Arizona Empire, and that beginning October 1 a force of at least thirty miners would be employed on the company's property, located in Empire Flats.

This is good news for this district, as the opening of the Arizona Empire on a good scale will be of much benefit to Parker, as well as stimulating the mining industry in that section of the district.

A few months ago a 20-ton shipment was made from this property to the Humboldt smelter. The ore averaged over \$60 per ton and netted the company about \$50 per ton.

## TO USE AUTOMOBILE FOR ROAD BUILDING (From Sunday's Daily.)

The generally accepted belief that the automobile is a vehicle of luxury is to be shattered by the innovation that is being perfected by County Road Superintendent D. M. Clark, who is transforming his big forty-horse power Stearns car into a road building utility at the shops of the Prescott Auto Company.

The rear seat has been discarded and a big air compressor to supplement it is being added. This apparatus will be driven by power from the gasoline engines, and attached thereto will be a big Burleigh mine drill. When assembled the car will be taken onto the Copper Basin grade, west of Government Springs, to bore into the old road in repairing and widening that highway under the plans of work decided upon. At several places the formation is attended with heavy rock work, which is impracticable for hand work. The new auto road excavator will be ready for service next week, and will be patented by Mr. Clark.

## Cavalry Gets Orders.
