If the plans of Earl E. Goodwin, local architect and structural engineer are successful, Camp Verde will soon have a water system. Mr. Goodwin arrived here from that place yesterday after a number of days' absence, and stated that he had been successful in securing water rights which are of sufficient capacity to provide the town with a water system adequate to all present or future needs, and that he was on the verge of meeting a proposition by the town which would result in the establishment of a water system there. It is known that there has been a general desire on the part of the citizens here to secure a water plant for a long time.

Mr. Goodwin also stated that he had secured title to a valuable tract of land for a friend in the east who was coming to this section of Arizona to locate. The man is a steamboat captain of means, and the character of citizen who, if pleased with the country, will bring others into this section.
