This development was authorized by engineers, and has been prosecuted since the present company assumed charge some time ago. FRONTIER DAYS ARE AGAIN IN LIMELIGHT (From Friday's Daily.) A motion carried at the meeting of the Yavapai County Chamber of Commerce last night for the appointment by the president of the chairman of a committee, the members of which are to be appointed by him, to look up the matter of holding a second frontier celebration in Prescott next July 4th, and report at the earliest possible moment. Among those who discussed the proposition were F. L. Haworth and Doc Pardee, and the consensus of opinion seemed to be that such a celebration would be feasible, although this point was not formally determined. It was stated by Doc Pardee that there would be a continuous frontier show in progress at the San Francisco-Panama exposition during the summer at which large prizes had been offered and that this might detract from the Prescott exhibition in the way of securing first-class talent. It was also suggested that a number of additional bucking horses would have to be purchased. President Aitken said he would appoint the committee very soon and get it to work. Dr. C. E. Yount, chairman of the advertising committee, to whom was referred a letter from A. H. Powers, editor of the Yavapai magazine, requesting that the directors of the organization use their efforts to secure a larger amount of advertising for the publication, reported the committee directed him to recommend that the directors should take no such action. He said it had been ascertained that \$1,900 is being sent out of Yavapai county annually to a Los Angeles publishing company to pay for the mechanical work on this magazine and that the committee thought this amount of money could be more profitably spent in advertising Prescott in some standard outside publication if it was to be sent out of the county at all. The report was unanimously approved. It was voted that the president appoint a committee of three to represent the chamber of commerce at the meeting of the State Good Roads Association in Phoenix February 5th, and such committee will be named later. By motion the secretary was instructed to keep a complete file for the benefit of the public of all the bills introduced in the house and senate of the Arizona legislature. Secretary Fraser had in his possession all but one of the bills so far introduced and gave a resume of their contents. A request of the city library board that the chamber of commerce, in conjunction with the school board and churches appoint a committee to select a librarian from among the list of about twenty applicants, was unanimously rejected, it being the consensus of opinion that the library board should not side-step this responsibility. The members consented to the procuring of a notarial seal for Miss Grace Sparkes, assistant secretary of the chamber, for use in the office of the organization. It was suggested that the organization lend assistance in the entertainment of guests in the city at the meeting of the Grand Lodge of Masons next month, but after R. N. Fredericks had stated that the Masonic organizations of Prescott had made all such arrangements, the matter was dropped. An application of Rev. S. G. Emerson, of the Congregational church, for membership at a fee for the first year of \$10, was accepted by a suspension of the rules. Rev. Emerson has changed the night of weekly prayer meetings for his church so as not to conflict with the meetings of the chamber of commerce. CARUTHERS JOINS VILLA.
