REMAINS OF JOHN SULLIVAN SHIPPED EAST FOR BURIAL Body of Former Clarkdale Man Who Died at Mercy Sunday Sent to Indiana Home The remains of John "Jack" Sullivan, who died Saturday evening at the Mercy hospital as the result of a heart attack, were shipped yesterday at 11:50 to his former home in Logansport, Ind., accompanied by David Mulcahy, also of Logansport, and a close friend of the deceased. The news of his death was quite a shock to his many friends in Clarkdale where the deceased was employed at the United Verde Copper company, in the capacity as auditor, and also at Jerome and Prescott, where he had a wide acquaintance. It was not until Sunday morning that his boyhood friends, Charles Murphy and Paul W. Mulcahy, also of Logansport, Ind., heard of his untimely death, and they immediately got into communication with his relatives regarding the disposition of the body. The deceased was born in Logansport in 1883, and spent his early days in the employ of the Pennsylvania railroad, leaving their employ to accept a position as court reporter at Fowler, Ind., during the term of Judge Joseph M. Rabb, now a prominent member of the Indiana bar. Later he was employed by the state highway department at Chicago, leaving there in the spring of 1913 for Arizona, where he became affiliated with the United Verde people where he has since been employed until his death. Floral offerings accompanying the remains were from the United Verde Copper company and several of the deceased's intimate friends in Clarkdale, Jerome and Prescott. Mr. Sullivan is survived by two sisters, Miss Kathryn Sullivan and Mrs. J. B. Collins, both of Logansport. The remains were escorted to the Santa Fe station by Carlton V. Smith, Naughton K. Farrall, Charles Murphy, David and Paul W. Mulcahy. LAW SHARPS ROPE BIG BULL SNAKE The visit of Superior Judge John J. Sweeney and Assistant County Attorney R. B. Westervelt to Humboldt yesterday, resulted in the imprisonment by lariat of a bull-snake and the subsequent delivery of the serpent to C. Totten, free of charges and tariffs. The animal is to be used in the forthcoming Smoki snake dance. The snake was first seen as the legal party was en route to Humboldt. They had no box, sack, bucket, tub, receptacle or other container, but somewhere in the car was a fishing line. Judge Sweeney held the snake down with a stick while Westervelt lassoed him. They were unable to hobble the snake, but picketed him to a rock, and on the return trip, stopped in Dewey and provided themselves with a box, in which the captive rode to town. IRON SPRINGS ROAD IN NEED OF REPAIR Need for First-Class Road Between Prescott and Springs Pointed Out by Supervisor The outing camp at Iron Springs, operated collectively by a group of 60 business men of Phoenix in an organization known as the Iron Springs Outing club, will open its summer season about the first of June, according to H. B. Wales, Prescott national forest supervisor, who returned yesterday from a trip to the Springs in the interests of the forest service. Located on Prescott national forest lands, and directly on the railroad, the camp at present affords accommodations for the families of the 60 members of the club, which provides water, light and other facilities, and operates a store at the Springs. It is Supervisor Wales' opinion, given yesterday upon his return from Iron Springs, that it would well pay Prescott to see that the road between this city and the camp is put into first-class shape, thus affording a route which would probably bring much summer traffic and trade to the city.
