

ARIZONA NEWS.

A "tent" of the fraternal order of Maccabees is to be organized at Mesa.

Material for an ore tramway at Morgan City, has been ordered from Denver.

Ed Roberts is in jail at Flagstaff to answer a charge of illegal branding of cattle.

The territorial normal school, at Tempe, will begin its term on September 4th.

Fine, large potatoes, grown in the vicinity, are now in the market at Flagstaff.

At Bisbee, week before last, twenty-three men were laid off by the Copper Queen mine.

The camp meeting at Norton's grove, near Phoenix, is drawing a big crowd every evening.

Reports from the San Pedro Valley are that the high water has flooded much of the country.

Since the first of last October the money expended on new buildings at Yuma aggregates \$50,000.

The new road in Yavapai county between Kirkland and Thompson's Valley, has been completed.

Many small mines and placer claims are being worked in the vicinity of Morgan City, Maricopa county.

The San Simon again put the roads in a wretched condition between Safford and Solomonville last week.

Commencing September 1st, there will be only one stage a week between Tucson and Quijotoa, instead of three.

Friday of last week, E. L. Gray, of Mesa, was caught in the tumbling rod of a thresher, and pretty badly bruised.

John Davis, a Verde rancher, is reported to have fallen heir to a snug fortune by the death of a relative in Missouri.

Winchester Miller of Tempe, has had a portion of his foot amputated to check the ravages of a cancer. He is recovering.

A well is being sunk on the road between Mesa and Goldfields, and as soon as water is developed a half way house will be established.

The new management at Harqua Hala, it is stated, will employ only American miners, in preference to Cholo and Indians.

Josiah Brown, who was a resident of Tombstone for many years, has just suffered the amputation of one of his legs in San Francisco.

Arizona pays more in taxes for her public schools, in proportion to her population, than any other state or territory in the Union.

At Phoenix last Friday, William Winch was bound over by the United States Commissioner on a charge of selling liquor to Indians.

Thursday morning of last week Mrs. Thomas Hughes of Tucson, wife of the ex-territorial auditor, was killed by an adobe wall falling on her.

The Pacific Insurance Union has raised the rate of premium in Arizona to meet the tax levied on insurance agents by the last legislature.

At Quijotoa the Imperial Gold Mining Company is sinking a deep well. They will not stop until they get water, if they have to sink 2000 feet.

Mr. W. Heath of Phoenix is reported to have absconded with several hundred dollars belonging to his employer, Frank Fuqua.

Sunday M. A. Schuster of Tombstone lost two valuable cows from drinking of cyanide solution in the tanks at the Boss mine.

The Huntington mill at Dos Cabezas will start on ore from the Pain and Casey mines. The five stamp mill is running on ore from the Silver Cave mine.

The establishment of a sanitarium at Tombstone is in contemplation. Is not "Tombstone" rather too suggestive a name for a place of resort for invalids?

The Old Dominion Copper Company, at Globe, has shut down its smelters for want of coke. Bad roads, caused by heavy rains, have stopped all freight teams.

Pete Caffrey's Baby mine at Layne Springs, Mohave county, is developing into a good property. He is taking out ore that runs as high as 1,000 oz. in silver per ton.

A quartz mill complete, capacity five to eight tons per day, is said to be on exhibition at the World's Fair, that will do good work and sells for \$1,000 each, aboard the cars.

The ranges of mountains beyond Superstition are full of prospectors and miners. A large number are looking for marvelously rich placers known to exist there some time ago.

Alfred Trippel, of Mesa, has received his instructions from the surveyor general and is preparing to begin on the large surveying contract which he obtained some time ago.

Postoffices have been discontinued, to take effect August 31, at Harcuvar, Maricopa county, mail therefor to go to Vulture; and at Otis, Pinal county, mail to go to Casa Grande.

The records of the internal revenue office for this district, comprising New Mexico and Arizona, show that during the fiscal year ending June 30, the receipts were \$49,109.89.

The Tucson fire department is in receipt of 1,000 feet of new rubber-lined hose, and is now in readiness for anything in the fire line that may occur. The hose is quite satisfactory.

Last week H. McComas, of Mesa, returned from Chicago with his son Roy, who was taken east some weeks ago for treatment by the Pasteur process, on account of a mad dog bite.

The territorial board of dental examiners will meet in Tucson on September 11. Several applicants for certificates to practice dentistry in the territory will appear for examination.

A large number of spectators attended the sale of government hospital and medical goods, last Friday, at Whipple, and enough wares were purchased to take care of any ill ever invented.

J. W. Lambert has been held by Justice Ramsey of Gila Bend, on a charge of grand larceny. He is accused of having stolen an entire freighting outfit—horses, harnesses, wagons, water barrels and all.

From Fort Huachuca comes a report that of the garrison of 350 men, fifty are in the hospital with typhoid malaria. Mexicans along the San Pedro are also down with it. Some fatalities have occurred.

Owing to the dry season of late years, calves have not been branded up as closely as usual. A stockman says many steers are on the range in Southern Arizona innocent of the marks of any branding iron. These will probably be sold at the next big round-up, for a fund in the cattlemen's association.

At the Hartt ranche, Pima county, the rains, says Mr. Hartt, have been light. They come right up to the fence and stop there. Mr. Hartt will have the top wire of the fence taken off, believing that will let in the rains.

On the 6th of next month the electors of Kingman will vote on the proposition to issue \$10,000 in school bonds for the purpose of building a new school building in the town of Kingman.

The San Bernardino ranche round-up, on the Mexican line, report seeing two bands of well-armed Apaches last Friday, about fifteen miles north of the line. One had fourteen Indians, the other six.
