ARIZOLA.

THE OASIS frequently receives letters of inquiry about Arizola, and as a general answer in reply to such inquiries, will say that Arizola is a town on the Southern Pacific Railway where the Florence Irrigating Canal crosses the track. Three years ago it was a desert; today there is a railway station at which all passenger trains of the Southern Pacific stop regularly, a telegraph office, a post office, an express office, a hotel, a store, a school-house, a printing office, a stock yard and chute for shipping cattle, and a thrifty and enterprising community, with a newspaper, THE OASIS, to speak for them. Three years ago the spot on which Arizola stands was taken up as desert land, for which the government was paid one dollar and twenty-five cents per acre. Today town lots are selling rapidly from one hundred dollars up, and cultivated land surrounding the town is worth from forty to sixty dollars an acre and upward. That is what has been done at Arizola in three years. Come and join in the grand work of making Arizola a prosperous city. We have the most fertile farming land in the United States, and a health giving climate not surpassed in the world.

Southwest Silver Convention.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., July 27, 1893. By resolution adopted by the session of the Southwest Silver Convention, held July 4th and 5th, 1893, at Silver City, New Mexico, the undersigned was designated as chairman of the executive committee, and directed to call a session of the Southwest Silver Convention at Albuquerque, New Mexico, during the territorial fair.

In accordance with such resolution all the miners and all the people of the great southwest, particularly of Colorado, Texas, Arizona and New Mexico, are requested to assemble at Albuquerque, New Mexico, on the 19th and 20th days of September, 1893. A full attendance is very desirable. If congress shall then have taken action favorable to silver, a jollification will then be in order. If congress shall then still be deliberating, the voice of the people, demanding protection from the avarice of the moneyed classes should be emphatically heard. If silver should be defeated in this congress, then the fight will only be begun—and it is our duty and privilege to assemble and make the power and determination of the southwest felt. If, as the Bill of Rights declares, "all political power is vested in and belongs to the people," and if we are worthy citizens of a country whose whole structure is built upon that sentence, as the foundation stone, then the people must be vigilant and active, and no self-sacrifice should be so great as to deter them.

Moreover, these gatherings are educational. We must meet and exchange ideas, and study and learn, in order to know the impregnable nature of our position to the end that, in the probably coming "battle of the standards" we may fight "freely, as men fight for the right."

A failure to attend will be taken as an evidence of ignorance, or indifference or both, and will injure our cause.
