The First Volunteer Injured

Monday a telegram from Colonel Wood, commander of the regiment in rendezvous at San Antonio, Texas, to join which the Arizona contingent, recently sent forward, was raised, conveyed the shocking intelligence that one of our Nogales volunteers, Marshall N. Bird, son of the editor of THE OASIS, had been dangerously, if not fatally injured from being thrown by a horse. A telegram published in the Phoenix papers stated that he had died from the effects of his injuries, but it was contradicted later. In response to a telegram of inquiry Captain McClintock wired later in the day that Marshall was at the post hospital, his condition favorable for recovery but still unconscious. Tuesday Captain McClintock wired that the young man's condition was reported precarious, being yet unconscious, but receiving every attention at the government hospital. Wednesday evening Captain McClintock again wired that Marshall was still unconscious but that the doctor had hopes for his recovery, which was the first word of encouragement received.

Wednesday Mr. James B. Mix, received from Harry Van Trees, one of Marshall's comrades, a detailed account of the accident. He stated that the men of the troop had been sent to bring in their horses from a place where they had been in keeping; taking only halters. They had been expected to lead the animals, but instead they all mounted, riding barebacked, without bits. Everything went nicely until the cavalcade was entering the park in which was located the camp ground, passing

through which Marshall's horse took fright and ran away. The course of the frightened animal's flight took him under a tree with low hanging branches, to evade which the rider ducked his head. At that very instant the horse shied, making the motion to lower his head a plunge which unseated the rider, throwing him head first with great violence against the trunk of the tree. Blood spouted from his ears and nostrils, and he was picked up unconscious.

A telegram this morning conveyed intelligence that he is improving.

In this connection Mr. Bird wishes to convey his thanks to the many sympathizing friends for their numerous and heartfelt expressions of condolence. Not only have such expressions of condolence come from friends neighbors in Nogales, and but many such messages have come from Tucson, Phoenix, El Paso, and elsewhere in the west. They are surely appreciated.
