This week there has been received at Torres by Oscar J. Smith, the ore buyer, five tons of high grade ore from the Candelaria mine, in La Barranca region, coming over by pack train. It was the fifth shipment from that mine since September 1st, the first one aggregating twelve tons. The ore yields high values in both gold and silver. Mr. Lachmann, the representative at Torres of Mr. Smith, reports increased activity in ore shipments since the close of the rainy season. *

Last Saturday night the passenger train leaving Hermosillo, Conductor W. P. Murphy, found a heavy twelve inch timber, about eight feet long, lying across the track about a mile from the station. Engineer Anderson brought his train to a stop as quickly as possible, but struck the timber and shoved it along a little distance by the nose of the pilot.
