SONORA SIFTINGS.

Collection of Happenings in the State Over the Line.

The last seaside excursion for this season, over the Sonora and Southern Pacific railways to coast points in California, will leave Guaymas on Wednesday, August 29th.

All trains on the Sonora railway stop for meal at Torres, going south for breakfast, northward for supper. At Theo. Olendorf's passengers find a first class meal, cooked American style, and at a reasonable price. *

Governor Ramon Corral, Licenciado J. N. Lopez and Engineer Ignacio Bonillas, who own the Myrah mine, immediately adjoining the Grand Central on the south, have given the Grand Central company a working bond on the Myra for one year, the price to be \$30,000, gold, if the bond be taken up at maturity.

At Minas Prietas the Creston-Colorada Mining Co. is negotiating with the proprietors of the Fortuna ground, lying adjacent to the Creston mine, for a working bond upon the latter property, and will probably close a deal for a six months bond, with a transfer of the ground, at maturity of the bond, upon payment of \$75,000 or \$100,000 gold.

At Hermosillo, Barney and Harry Cohen of the Grand Hotel, have leased their dining room to Mr. Fabian Naegelin, a chef of long experience, and a most thorough and accomplished caterer, and Mr. Naegelin will take charge tomorrow, August 12th. In the meantime the dining room and kitchen are being renovated and newly furnished throughout, and under the new regime the Grand will set the best table in Sonora or Arizona.

A telegram from the City of Mexico, dated August 3rd, says: The federal government has granted a valuable concession to A. J. Stewart, of New Windsor, Illinois, for the famous Fuerte river valley, in the state of Sinaloa, close to Sonora. Fuerte valley has an area of 200,000 acres, and Mr. Stewart owns 65,000 acres near Topolobam o bay, on the line of the proposed Kansas City, Mexican and Orient railroad. The concession grants the holder the right to use one-half of the water from the Fuerte river. If the scheme is consummated it will prove of great benefit to the state. Survey plans and location of canal will be made next spring.

In Phoenix last week Judge Street denied the motion of W. C. Greene to dissolve the injunction in the Cobre Grande case, and to use the language of the court, "the injunction is retained until plaintiff can have a reasonable time to get a determination of its cause in the courts of Mexico, where the property is situate, and have had opportunity to be placed in possession of the mines and have had the title to them adjusted so that it may act under the contract without molestation from the defendants and without jeopardy to its money due on deferred payments."

The concentrator and smelter recently erected at the Nacosari mines of the Copper Queen company at Nacosari, Sonora, will begin treating ore within the next sixty days.

The Bateman group of mines at San Miguelito, has been acquired by F. C. Fenner and others and development work will be proceeded with at once.

There has been appointed a commission of engineers consisting of Mr. Ignacio Bonillas of Nogales, Sonora, and the government engineer, Mr. Avila, to inspect the workings of the Creston mine, at La Colorada, where they have reached the ground of the Fortuna mine, and determine whether the line has been crossed.

The Hermosillo Chamber of Commerce has promulgated its new directory, elected on July 20th to serve the ensuing year. The officers elect are Rafael Ruiz, president; Manuel Y. Loatza, vice president; Miguel Gaxiola, treasurer; J. Guillermo Dominguez, secretary; Alberto May, Emilio Berand, German Luders, Francisco Roldan, Julio Carranza, directors. The chamber has done good work, during the past year, in forwarding the commercial interests of Hermosillo and Sonora, and it is preparing to extend and increase its usefulness.
