The case of the Albuquerque Bank against W. G. Stewart, E. S. Clark, Thomas McMillan, Al Doyle and W. A note was executed by three of these defendants, in the amount of \$2,500, with interest. It was assigned to the bank and secured by collaterals, which they claim was diverted improperly to the cancellation of other indebtedness. The principle asserted is, that if collateral is placed in the hands of the payee of the note as security, and it is afterwards applied to other purposes, it operates as a release of the security to the amount of the collateral.

Case of Territory vs. Ed. Keyes; jury returned and rendered verdict: "We, the jury in the above entitled cause find the defendant guilty of voluntary manslaughter, and recommend him to the mercy of the court."

THURSDAY, June 13. The case of Salzman vs. Hull was resumed this morning. Jury charged and retired.

FRIDAY, June 14. Territory vs. Park Pierce. Grand jury having ignored the bill, defendant was discharged. He had been arrested with Keyes, as accessory to murder.

Reese vs. Rhodes. Case occupied the attention of the court yesterday and this morning. It is claimed that the plaintiff became indebted to the defendant \$4,450 for certain real estate in this county, for which he delivered a paper intended to be a mortgage. The plaintiff paid several sums of money, having a balance due of \$2,896.63, which he offered to the defendant, who now claims the land and premises absolutely. The indebtedness is claimed to be wholly disproportionate to the value of the land and premises. The plaintiff asks that the deed be declared a mortgage, the defendant to account for payments made to him by plaintiff; that he be allowed to redeem the said mortgage upon paying the amount due.

LORENTHAL & MEYERS vs. CALDEN HENNING et al. On motion of Attorney Van Horn, action was dismissed as to C. H. Henning. He asked that the minutes of June 12 be corrected to show that the defendant of this case as against Defendants Babbitt and Donahue be final and full, but as against Henning be without prejudice, except as to the mortgage security on property in dispute, which is fully released to said defendant. The Atlantic and Pacific tax cases were decided this morning satisfactory to all parties. Judgment was rendered in the supreme court, for the taxes of 1887, and in the district court for 1888, amounting to about \$43,900, which amount will be promptly paid by Judge W. C. Hazledine, solicitor of the road, who has been willing for months to settle on this basis.

In the Supreme court, this morning, a decision was rendered in the matter of an application for a writ of mandamus, to compel the governor of the territory to sign a warrant issued by the auditor to cover the expenses of the insane asylum, as estimated by the commissioners. Judge R. Barnes read the opinion of the court, Chief Justice Wright concurring, refusing the mandate. Judge Porter dissented.
